NANCY BLAND NEEDHAM (C1810-)

Nancy was the daughter of Benjamin Bland (C1768-) of Randolph County North Carolina and the granddaughter of Moses Bland (C1718-1800) and his wife Jane Wiggonton (C1730-). Nancy was born in Randolph County North Carolina. On December 24, 1839, she married a cousin Bailey Needham in Jennings County Indiana. Before marrying Nancy, Bailey Needham married Zerilda Holman in 1838, who evidently died giving birth to their only child George. Bailey Needham and Nancy Bland had three children, Zerila, Silas and Emerine. Bailey's mother was Ann Bland, (C1774-1855), who was born in Guilford County North Carolina, the daughter of Moses Bland and Jane Wiggonton. Ann married John Needham (C1769-1850) about 1789, in Henry County Kentucky. Ann died in Tipton County Indiana after a life in which she gave birth to thirteen children, including Bailey.

Some states are placing genealogical records on line and web-sites related to genealogical research are popping up frequently if not every day. To me, one of the most interesting and useful for new contacts is The Genealogy Forum: http://genforum an exchange site for the name you are researching. During the past year, The genealogy Forum has aided me greatly in outreach to new sources, including some dramatic discoveries that are incorporated into this volume of AMONG COUSINS. For the past several years, the National Bland Reunion has considered possible ways to open up our own Bland Family web-site, and I am hopeful that we will accomplish that goal in 1999-2000.

Another tool of course, is E-mail, which enables correspondents to communicate instantly and at low cost, to make quick clarifying in quires about complex questions, or simply to stay in touch. Beginning with this issue, I am including available e-mail addresses in the Subscribers and Correspondents section, pp. . If your name appears in this section without e-mail, please send your e-mail address and I will include it in the next volume.

THE 14th NATIONAL BLAND REUNION: Our Fourteenth National Reunion was held in Louisville Mississippi, August 14-16, 1998, sponsored by John and Sharon Black from Starkville Mississippi. John and Sharon organized the reunion at the pleasant, Lake Tiak-O'Khata Resort, and the ambiance was great. Attendance was about eighty, including a half and half mix of old timers who come to all or many of the reunions and local Blands, mostly from the family of Blands settled in Webster County Mississippi by descendants of the ancestor Joseph Bland (C1754-1800) of Duplin County North Carolina. This marks the second reunion sponsored by this family, who has surely given freely of itself to support the reunion tradition. The 14th Reunion honored this branch of the Bland family. On the following page I am displaying a photograph taken at the Reunion, of John and Sharon Black, as well as Angela and Hop Alford, who sponsored the 1989 Reunion in Cumberland Mississippi and several other cousins from the Mississippi Branch. Also, see the photo of Pinkie Miller (1862-1890) an ancestor from this family, on page 7.

One of the pressing issues for the Reunion which has been episodically addressed in the past is the need for a permanent organization. At the $14^{\rm th}$ Reunion, we held a special meeting to address how to begin this process. The conclusion was that we

The committee consisted of myself and: John and Sharon Black, Starkville Mississippi; David Bland and Joan Bland, Independence by God Missouri; Virgil Bland, Phoenix Arizona; Mildred Hunter, Pleasant Grove Utah; Patricia Marsh, Sellersburg Indiana. In February, David Bland wrote a preliminary position paper, masterfully positioning himself like the Virginia Delegation to the Constitutional Convention of 1787, since from that point we debated slight alterations in David's master plan. In essence, I wrote to about twenty cousins who have been faithful supporters of the reunion since its inception and asked them to attend a special meeting on August 6, at the Fifteenth Reunion, at which time we will appoint six members of a Board of Directors, who will thereafter stand election, beginning in 2000, in staggered terms, so that two members of the board stand for election each year. I will announce the composition of the original Board of Directors on Saturday the 7th. This board will in turn appoint a working committee of 4-6 members, each of whom will have some specialized task to work on during the year and will be available to consult with other committee members as well as members of the Board. Members of the working committee will serve at the pleasure of the Board of Directors, who are elected by the plenary reunion group (or a similar body). Issues that immediately present themselves are:

- 1. <u>Use of Computer Technology</u> at a range of levels, including the outreach necessary to stabilize and increase attendance at Reunion, as well as to enhance interest in Bland Family research in general.
- 2. <u>Administration:</u> Maintenance of financial and other records relative to the Reunion and Family History Project.
- 3. Reunion Planning: One of the most pressing immediate issues is that there is no Reunion Site for the 16th Reunion in 2000. For too long, this task has been a matter of my locating a Cousin who will sponsor the reunion and that Cousin then shouldering the work of organizing and planning the Reunion, either alone, or with assistance of family of friends.
- 4. Special Projects: There are some issues relative to the Bland family's history that we should be involved in. One of the immediate issues is involvement in the episodically addressed but on-going issue of maintenance of the historical cemetery (or what's left of it) at Hopewell Virginia, where is buried Richard Bland (1710-1776) the Revolutionary Patriot and cousin and mentor of Thomas Jefferson. This is an issue that has long been a sore spot, for there is no continuous mechanism for preservation and care of this historical site. On June 18, 1999, Cousin Vera Moore of Hopewell called me and told me that she and her husband Bill, were paying a caretaker from their own pocket to have this done. Vera later told me that Richard Bland College has reimbursed her partially. The point is that these are all ad hoc measures, done with sacrifice and goodness. What is needed is for the Bland Reunion Group not to raise money for ad hoc assistance but to lend its support to establishment of a permanent and continuing maintenance of these grounds.

At the Fifteenth National Reunion we will make a beginning. I'm sure our efforts will take work and patience to evolve into a smoothly working process, but this is the first step.

THE 15th NATIONAL REUNION It is amazing to think that we have persisted since 1985, when John Bland and I organized the First National Bland Reunion at John's home in Elizabethtown Kentucky. After 15 years, we now come full circle back to Kentucky where we will congregate on August 6-8 at Berea Kentucky, near Lexington. It will be great. Our host, Patricia Marsh, who in the age of email, has kept in touch with me more closely than reunion sponsors did in previous years, has done a magnificent job of organizing the Reunion, which will pay tribute to the Kentucky pioneers, especially to the family that descended from Charles Bland (1765-1842) and his wife Phyllis Pope (1773-1818). For those who are inclined to read the meanest, most exclusionary and

worst in everything, let me hasten to add that if you are from another family, you are still welcome. It's just that at each Reunion, we honor the specific family from which the host descends.

If you receive this newsletter before the Reunion and decide that you'd like to attend, I encourage you to contact Patricia Marsh at 812-246-9122 or e-mail pmarsh@venus.net. Pat will assist you with information on how to proceed. I can sense that this is going to be a special reunion in which we also will take positive steps toward continuing our reunion through a viable family organization. I hope to see all of you there.

PINKIE MILLER BLAND (1862-1890)

Joseph Bland of Duplin County North Carolina, (C1754-1800), was a Revolutionary Soldier. When he died, Joseph had two children, Joseph Henry Bland and Mary Bland. A son called "Henry" was Joseph Henry Bland (October 16, 1785 - 1862) born in Duplin County North Carolina and died in Perry County Alabama. He married Mary Ann Rea May (1793-1850) of Raleigh North Carolina on February 17, 1810. Joseph Henry and Mary Ann moved from North Carolina to Alabama with their 10 children, and the children moved on to Webster County Mississippi. Among these ten children was Robert Galbert Bland (1817-1862), who married Frances Morgan Wilkinson (1824-1902. They were parents of six children, including an oldest son Joseph Henry Bland (1847-1941), who married a woman named Pinkie Miller (1862-1890 on February 7, 1878. Of Pinkie, Joseph Henry Bland the dreamy lover, wrote: 1

"I was near 30 year old before I found that sweet girl of my dreams. She was born May 1862 and you can bet your socks she was a Pink of the rarest kind and pretty, as pretty as she could be. But the half I have told, she was so sweet, so lovely, so kind and tender harted . . . her eyes were blue and her hare was golish. She was so kind, she never spoke an unkind word to no one, and was a true lover of the Lord. We had four girls. Well, I lost dear Pinkie, she died in 1890, the 12th of April. . ."

UPDATE OF THE KEY TO BLAND FAMILY LINES

Periodically, it is useful to update the key to family lines that I previously laid out in Volume 12-2, pp. 10-17. Please note the name and address list for your name, pp. and if you think you are designated to the wrong group, let me know. When I hear from new correspondents, If your name and address is not included or no key is assigned, also let me know.

The James River Blands

- 1-1. Robert or Roger Bland (C1500-), Westmoreland County England, wife unknown.
- 1-2. Adam Bland (1528-1594), Westmoreland County and London, married Joan Atkyns, (C1530-1596). Adam and Joan had thirteen children including:
- 1-3. John Bland (1572-1632), "The Grosser" of London, who married Susan Deblere (1590-1665). John and Susan had a family of 17, of whom 12 lived to adulthood. Of these, the following were responsible for settlements in Virginia.
 - 1-4A. Susan Bland (1609) who married Thomas Pearson.
- 1-4B. Edward Bland (1614-1652), who married Jane Bland, daughter of Edward's uncle Gregory Bland.
 - 1-4C. Theodorick Bland (1629-1671), who married Anna Bennett.

- 2-3. George Bland (1636-died after 1675), of his father's town and parish, married Grace .
- 2-4. James Bland (1661 1709), of his father's town and parish, moved to London and to East Jersey in 1684, was in Virginia by 1687, and died in Stafford County in 1709. He may have married twice, but at the time of his death was married to Margaret .

2-5A-6A. James Bland (1704-1774), Prince William County Virginia and New Hanover/Duplin County North Carolina. James married Mary (Buchannan?). 2-5C. John Bland (C1688-1762), of Prince William County Virginia, married Prudence . It would seem plausible that Prudence was not John's first wife. John is discussed in VU, pp. 417ff and 463-477, and AC: 4-2, pp. 7-8. John and Prudence appear to have had two sons:

- 2-5D. Robert Bland, dates unknown, was a minor child noted in the will of James Bland, (1661-1708). A later document attests that he died without issue. Robert is discussed in VU, pp. 484-488. It is my belief that this child died young, and that the Robert Bland who lived to adulthood and whose children migrated to Edgefield County South Carolina was a son of William Bland (C1682-1744, cf AC: 2-2, pp. 13-14).
- $2-5\mathrm{E-H}$ Alice, Ellen, Patience and Hannah Bland. Dates unknown, all were minors in 1709. Ellen Bland married Isaac Davis. Nothing more is known of these daughters of James Bland (C1661-1709). They are discussed in VU, pp. 260-261 and 267.

NB: The division of the children noted by James Bland in his will of 1709, between older brothers William, James and John, and minor children Robert, Alice, Hannah, Ellen and Patience, leads to my speculation that James was married twice and that his wife Margaret was the mother of the minor children only.

I received a letter from Nelle Mang, on June 3, 1999, telling me that her husband Conrad Dell Mang had passed away on February 10, 1999. This is very difficult news to learn and impart to you, for among the early correspondents in my work, Conrad Mang was singularly energetic, generous and insightful in his work. Nelle was descended from David Bland (1843-1927) a son of John Bland (1811-1886) and Mary Foreman (1816-1904) of Orange County Texas, whose line originated with the Loudon County Virginia/Edgefield County South Carolina stem family. David's insighful history is put to good use below in the discussion about this family, (see pp.). Conrad then, married into the Bland family but took up the cause of its history. He taught me so much of what I know about this family and with Eva Dowdy and the late Juanita Alexander and Eloise Stoudenmier, should be counted among its best historians. Conrad also traveled to England in 1984 and came back with a rich lode of information, including the detail that enabled me to conclude without ambiguity that James Bland born in Cumberland County Englanmd in 1661 and died in Stafford County Virginia, were the same man. Conrad and Nelle joined with the late Marian Daniels to give a copy of A Vision of Unity to the Clayton Library in Houston Texas, and Conrad and Nelle donated a copy of A vision of Unity to The Museum and Library of Maryland History in Baltimore.

Conrad was born on March 29, 1920 in Lockhart Texas. In March 1942, When it came time to sign up with Uncle Sam, Conrad, because of his love of boats and aversion to killing, served in the U.S. Coast Guard. The previous Fall, he'd met a beautiful and charming young woman named Nelle and they were married on August 7, 1943. They had two children.

After his Cost Guard stint, Conrad earned his Bachelor's degree in Education at University of Houston. He worked as an elementary school teacher and principal and was a Professor of Education and Departmental Chair at Lamar University in Beaumont. Conrad retgired in 1982 and pursued many hobbies, joining his love of travel and genealogical research among many others. I am grateful to Nelle Mang for providing such a thorough and interesting biography of Conrad and the photograph displayed belowof Conrad Mang in the summer of his life. JOHN BLAND Cousin Susan Folmar is searching for further information about John Bland (C1828-), himself a son of David Bland (17992-1874), within the Bland Family of Frederick County Virginia (AC 9-2, pp. 6-28, esp. p. 27). John married Rebecca Core, (C1822-). Cousin Susan writes to me, "I'd like to know where that information came from. Hope you have time to check your files." My best answer is that this is an assertion I made in 1991 and my files are presently in chaos. One of the big projects in the next year is to get them organized. Until then, anyone else who can help, both Cousin Susan and me would be grateful.

JOHN A. BLAND Cousin S. Link Alley is searching for the parents of John A. Bland (C1837-1926), whom he believes is the father of his second great grand paw, Francis Marion Bland (1865-1939). John married Mary Ellen Hoyles, (1840-1900). John was born in Clarke County Illinois. He was buried at the Wright Cemetery in Sullivan, Moultrie County Illinois. Francis Marion Bland was born in Lovington, Moultrie County Illinois, and married Mary Alice White on November 18, 1884, in Moultrie County.

JOHN H. BLAND Cousin Linda Matthews is looking for information dated from the 1800s on the Bland family of Howard Township and Bellefonte Boro, Centre County, Pennsylvania. Of specific

interest is **John H. Bland**, who was born in Howard, C1838 and who may have died in either Anderson, Indiana or Kane Pennsylvania around 1888.

JOHN MILTON BLAND Cousin Jeanette Crerar is searching for the father of John Milton Bland (c1827-1900) born Oldham County Kentucky, and died in Clark County Missouri. According to Cousin Jeanette, "family say its Isaac Bland, but I can't find a wife before he married Nancy Floyd in 1832 in Missouri."

JOSIAH BLAND Cousin Bernard Bland (phone 703-960-2789) is searching for the parents and ancestry of his third great grand paw Josiah Bland. Josiah was orphaned during the early 1800s and two guardian bonds were issued by Caroline County Virginia: to George Marshall on October 14, 1813, for Josiah and his orphaned siblings of Thomas Bland. A second bond was issued to Thomas Bell on September 11, 1815 for guardianship of Josiah, who later married Thomas' daughter Nancy Ann Bell in Fredericksburg Virginia on February 13, 1821. Cousin Bernie asks, who was the mysterious Thomas Bland who fathered Josiah Bland. Though I don't want to prejudice a response to this search, it may be useful to say that Cousin Bernie's ancestry is probably within the King and King County Virginia family discussed previously in AC 9-1, pp. 14-36.

THOMAS BLAND Cousin Ray Jean Hay is seeking the ancestors and descendants of Thomas Bland, C1760. Thomas is Cousin Hay's fourth great grand paw, he married Sarah . Their known child, Charity Bland was born September 11, 1786 and died August 15, 1836. Charity married Moses Caten on May 18, 1803 in Craven County North Carolina. Moses was born December 29, 1783 and died October 15, 1850. Moses Caten and Charity Bland were believed to have lived in Beaufort County North Carolina.

NOTA BENE: Note the discussion below, pp. , about this entire family. I believe Thomas was born earlier than 1760, but what I wrote is the first serious attempt to document the proposed inter relationships between the Blands in Beaufort, Bertie, Craven, Edgecombe, Martin and Pitt Counties North Carolina, it is admittedly speculative, some of it undoubtedly erroneous and certainly subject to change. Some members of this family left North Carolina for Shelby County Tennessee and later from there to points in Arkansas. Others may have gone to Georgia and Alabama. This is an area of inquiry that needs some persistent historians, and I am grateful to Cousin Hay, as well as Barbara

Harris Carlton Bland and Edith Bland and others who are working in that direction. I believe this may open a diffuse dialogue about the possibilities and I'm looking forward to what develops over the next year.

WHO ARE THESE BLANDS ??

Cousin Carol Akers sent this intriguing photograph to me. Several persons in the composition are known, including Ida Alabama Bland (March 23, 1881 - February 11, 1919), (back row, third from right) Cousin Akers' granny. Ida was buried at Maxville Cemetery in Sharp County Arkansas. She was the daughter of George Washington Bland (1834 - July 31, 1925) and Sarah Amanda Ring, (December 23, 1843 - August 31, 1916), (front row, flanked between two men). Ida's siblings were May P. Bland, Almeda Bland, Elizabeth Bland, Martha Bland, Texcie M. Bland, and Unis (Eunice) (C1884 -). Pat Leatherman says that George and Amanda had another soon Martin Texas Bland who married Allie Mintie and raised a grand son Robert Lee Byrd. Carol Akers found a son Robert lee Bland (1886-) in the 1900 census. According to Pat Cousin Leatherman, these Blands are buried in Powell's Chapel Cemetery in Evening Shade, presumably in Sharp County.



THE BLANDS OF KENTUCKY

Because of the National Family Reunion's congregation in Kentucky for the Fifteenth Reunion, I have thought it useful to reprise as completely as possible the founding of the major Kentucky lines. In context of this paper, it seems useful to establish a schematic table that delineates the children of James Bland, the pioneer settler from England, who died in Stafford County Virginia. He had three sons and eight grandsons whom we know of:

FIRST AMERICAN GENERATION: James Bland (1661-1709) migrated to East Jersey and subsequently, Virginia in the 1680s. He was married to an unknown (to us) woman and subsequently to Margaret . When he died, James had four sons, two who were adults and one on the cusp of his majority. It is important to note that as far as we know, these were the only sons of James Bland who had heirs:

SECOND AMERICAN GENERATION:

WILLIAM BLAND (c1686-1744)

James Bland (C1707-1774) Robert Bland (C1708-1760) Moses Bland (C1718-1800) Thomas Bland (C1719-1788) John Bland (C1725-1795)

JAMES BLAND (c1687-1756)

Benjamin Bland (C1724-1771) Arthur Bland

JOHN BLAND (c1688-1762/1763) John Bland (C1742-1807)

This paper will delineate the lineage of the sons of these three second generation American Bland's as well as their children and when new evidence requires it, additional information about the line, until it crosses over the $20^{\rm th}$ century boundary.

THE BLANDS OF MASON AND GARRARD COUNTY KENTUCKY

DESCENDANTS OF ROBERT BLAND, 1708-1760

One of the early settlers in Mason County Kentucky was Micajah Bland a son of John Bland (1758-1781) the eldest son of Robert

Bland (1732-1787) of Loudon County Virginia and Edgefield County South Carolina. 2 Family legend holds that John Bland was killed in the American Revolution, and because of his early death, Micajah was his only child. Micajah was born about 1780. He moved to Mason County Kentucky in the early 1800s and on September 24, 1804, married Milly Martin. Micajah lived in Maysville but must have died sometime in 1826, for when his daughter Mary married Samuel Cochran on November 21, 1826, her mother signed the consent papers. 3

Micajah had two other daughters, Pamela Bland, who married John Cockrell on February 27, 1828 and Celesta Ann Bland, who married Dempsey Carrell on April 8, 1847. Micajah also had a son named John, about whom nothing more is known. 4

DESCENDANTS OF BENJAMIN BLAND (1724-1771)

Two grandsons of James Bland (C1687-1755) 5 second son of the Northern Virginia founder James Bland (C1661-1709) moved out to Kentucky in the 1790s. They were James Bland (C1750-1802), who migrated to Mason County and Charles Bland (1765-1842) who migrated to Garrard County. A third brother, Jacky Bland, (C1770-1822) appears to have stayed in Virginia but several of his identified children moved into Ohio, then to Illinois and Missouri. 6 They are

Others who have made major contributions are John W. Bland, Elizabethtown Kentucky, who spent a day with me in August 1985, scouring the records of the Filson Club in Louisville Kentucky, an effort that produced a number of useful documents, particularly a letter from Helen Bland of Bagdad Kentucky dated February 10, 1982, which will be referred to herafter as Helen Bland; Robert Cauble Bland, Charlotte North Carolina; Robert E. and Alta Bland of Vandalia Missouri; Judith Roby Cash of Alexandria Virginia; Donald Gurley, Walnut Creek California; Sherrill Rae Hoefer, Craig Colorado; Merrilyn Gail Lewellen, Fort Worth Texas; James and Jerry Lillard, Tampa Florida; Patricia Marsh, Sellersburg Indiana; Czerna Nall, Lakeport California and Marsha Smith Hamilton, While this paper was in progress, Kevin Fraley of Seattle Washington contacted me with information about Benjamin Bland's son John, opening up a new line of inquiry about which I had previously been unaware. Benjamin, the eldest son of James Bland (C1687-1756) married about 1748. 7 Mary's will was made August 3, 1782 and probated October 28, 1782. 8 Eight children were listed in Mary's will:

- 1. JAMES BLAND (1752 after 1802) 9 James was the executor of his mother's will, indicating he was the eldest child of Benjamin and Mary. The transcription of a Bible Record dated 1853 Polly Purcell, gives James birth year as (month obscured 1752). James estate was settled in Fauquier County Virginia, on October 25, 1802. 10 At the time, his administratrix was his wife Margaret Bland. James was in Mason County Kentucky between 1790-1800, and Margaret and her children found there in 1806 and Mrs. James found Margaret alive in the 1810 census and she was executor of her son John's estate and gave consent to her daughter Esme's marriage in 1811. James and Margaret had nine children:
 - A. BENJAMIN VILLARY BLAND (July 20, 1786 October 24, 1824) 12 was born in Fauquier County Virginia and died in Columbia Alabama. He married Mary Rolf (December 23, 1795 - March 15, 1857), a young woman from Essex County New Jersey, on November

In mother's will, James was identified as her oldest son, and James was appointed executor of the estate, indicating he was at least 21 in 1782, hence a long standing assumption that he was born no later than 1761. James, p. 10. I am seeking some clarification on the date of James' will. Among the effects sent me by Bob and Alta Bland in their letter of January 2, 1998, was a will of James Bland, made out in Garrard County Kentucky either in 1802 or 1807. The month and day were obscured and the preceding document was made out September 24, 1801. In it James names his brother Charles J. Bland and his sister Elizabeth ("Betty" in his mother's will as co-executors, with no mention of a wife. Interestingly, there is no mention of a wife, Margaret. The pivotal question is whether this will was made out in 1802 or 1807. Anyone who has a clearer copy of the document may confirm one way or another.

In AC 4-2, at page 24, there is a note of Elizabeth Bland of Mason County marrying Charles Williams, with William Bland as bondsman. A key reference for this group is the Martin Bible, Kentucky Bible Records, DAR, Vol. III, furnished

by Don Gurlev.

24, 1813 in Mason County Kentucky, where they raised a family of five children: 13

(1) Caroline Bland (April 27, 1810 -). Caroline married Francis W. Cleneay, but the dates of the

marriage are unknown. 14

James Bland (November 2, 1813 - October 11, 1878).

James married Hannah Martin (October 2, 1817 - July 25, 1906) on November 16, 1837. James and Hannah died in Maysville, Mason County, Kentucky. James and Hannah had a daughter, Laura Ann Bland (August 5, 1839 - August 7, 1839)

(3) Nathaniel R. Bland (December 26, 1818 - April 3, 1848). Nathan never married and died in New Orleans Louisiana but was buried in Maysville Kentucky.

(4) Charles Henry Bland (September 2, 1819 - 1888). Charles married Elizabeth Stith (August 7, 1826 -) in Mason County on November 25, 1846. Subsequently, they moved to Lewis County Missouri where their children were born:

(a) Mary Bland (C1850 -).

- (b) Nathaniel Rolf Bland (July 17, 1851 April 12, 1920). Nathaniel married Susie Mary Fishback on April 29, 1903 at Quincy Illinois and died at Verdis Oklahoma.

The 1850 Census shows that two Blands of indeterminate linkage lived in Mason County, including Owen Bland, (C1811 -) a laborer from Ireland and James Bland (C1832 -) a carpenter who was born in Kentucky. 20

Charles and Phillis built a brick house that still stands at Lancaster Kentucky, location of many a dramatic scene. Charles Bland and Phillis Pope had fifteen children: 24

James, p. 14. Charles made out his will on May 19, 1841 in Garrard County, VU p. 407, and actual will, (copy) sent by Bob and Alta Bland January 2, 1998. An undated codicil indicates the will was made out May 19, 1842, and the codicil was produced at court in October 1842. Unless there is convincing evidence to the contrary, dates given for the family of Charles Bland and Phillis Pope follow the Perrin Bible, cf James pp. 14-16. A major question is who is Amelia Bland, identified in James, p. 16, as born August 4, 1817. The juxtaposition of dates with Alemander Bland makes it impossible that she was the daughter of Charles and Phillis. She might then have been a daughter out of wedlock by one of their older children. Who was she, and what happened to her?

The precision of the dates is attributable to a Family Bible, VU pp. 407-408, with additional information supplied from the Filson Club in Louisville Kentucky, displayed in AC 4-2, pp. 25-26. James, at p. 14, indicates that the Family Bible was owned by Mrs. Ellen Perrin, a daughter of Jeremiah Bland, of Lancaster Kentucky. Phillis was the daughter of Thomas Pope and Ann Duncan. The Family Bible stated that Philis dies in October 1818, but someone later inserted April. Mrs. James spells her name Phillis, though the Family Bible spells it Philles.

- A. THOMAS BLAND (December 10, 1791 July 18 1845). Thomas was born in Lincoln County Kentucky and moved to Pike County Missouri where he died. Thomas married Elizabeth Duncan (-C1843) 25 in Garrard County Kentucky on November 27, 1819. Thomas and Elizabeth had nine or ten children. 26 The younger children were returned to Kentucky after the death of Thomas and Elizabeth, and according to Pat Marsh, raised by a brother, William W. Duncan (1802-1866).
 - (1) Benjamin Mason Bland (November 13, 1820 March 14, 1868). Benjamin was not noted by Mrs. James and his name was introduced by Cousins Gail Lewellen of Fort Worth Texas and Sherrill Rae Hoefer of Craig Colorado in 1989. 27 Benjamin married Sarah Hodges (March 3, 1824 December 25, 1915) 28 in Bowling Green, Pike County Missouri, April 14, 1842. As noted below Benjamin and Sarah took in Benjamin's younger brother Dalzel Bland (alternately called William Leland Smith Bland) after the death of Thomas Bland and Elizabeth Duncan. 29 In addition, they had a family of twelve children of their own: 30
 - (a) George Thomas Bland (May 6, 1843 October 4, 1862). George was killed in the Civil War. 31

I have previously given the date of death of Thomas and Elizabeth as July 18, 1845, based on Helen Bland's emphatic statement that Thomas and Elizabeth died the same day, July 18, 1845. This, however, is apparently in error, for on that date, James Moseley, a son in-law of Thomas Bland, received payment from Thomas's brothers John and Joseph, for transporting five of Thomas and Elizabeth's children back to Kentucky where they were raised by William Duncan. Moseley was the husband of Mason Bland, a daughter of Thomas Bland and Elizabeth Duncan. On August 17, 1845, Moseley made out a receipt for payment of \$46. from John and Joseph Bland payment received on July 18, 1845. On April 12, 1856, in Garrard County Kentucky, as part of a suit between Charles Joshua Bland and Henry Jameson, husband of William's older sister Mary, Peter Oatman testified that three of the Bland Children, "Betsy, Sarah and Wm. H. Bland" had been brought back to Kentucky. In the same hearing, John Davis Bland, an older brother, confirmed that following the death of Thomas Bland and Elizabeth Duncan, William H. Bland and "four others" were brought from Missouri by James Moseley.

See Note below, for the possibility that a Jeremiah Bland born July 22, 1840, is a son of Thomas and Elizabeth.

William was defined in one document as a "brisk" boy, but also who complained of rheumatism from an early age, was one of the children who was returned from Pike County Missouri to Shelby County Kentucky by his brother in-law Moseley above). A deposition in Garrard County on April 12, 1856, by Benjamin Sutton, confirms that William Henry was returned from Pike County but that he was actually in custody of Aunt Betsy Bland (1802-1882) Josiah Bland (1812-1894), Charles Charles Josiah was married, and that William Henry continued to live with his Aunt Betsy February 1856, 56 at which time he evidently became Sutton's ward. Charles Joshua Bland had guardianship of William Henry Bland from 1855 on. John Davis Bland (1832-1887) confirmed that William lived with Charles Joshua Bland from Christmas of 1845 until "this past winter" meaning 1855-1856. He also said that his sister Elizabeth Bland (1833-1856) lived in the same household and made most of William Henry's clothes. Elizabeth died January 8, 1856, so this was obviously a bitter end to a hard decade for poor William.

Curses and hellfire!! Will, born in 1857, was a handsome young man of twenty five in 1882, 5' 11" and about 150 pounds, blue eyes and pale brown hair, clean shaven except for a neat little mustache which twitched to one side when he got angry. Will was given to a fondness for women, put here on earth for their benefit it was said (he said, and we're not talking about Aunt Betsy here) and drink (how do you think he came to confuse Aunt Betsy with a piece of chopping wood?). A notorious no good and prominent black sheep in the Bland Family of America, which is crawling with 'em, Will never made a home for himself and lived with his father until in Fall 1881, his father ran him out of the house. Will played on Aunt Betsy's sympathy and moved in with her and her brother Josiah, who had been living with her since his children reached adulthood. On the late afternoon of January 20, 1882, Aunt Betsy was making dinner and Uncle Joe was in town. Will put it this way:

the world against her; had no motive in killing her; loved her like a mother. She had always been a mother to me. . . Did not rob her or take anything from her. When I got home from the still house, I saw the ax at the wood pile; then the awful thought came over me to take the ax and kill my aunt. I took it and went into the room where she was sitting by the fire, knitting. Sat down by the fire for several minutes, then arose from the chair, and struck her with the sharp edge of the ax. . . I have no earthly excuse for the awful deed. . . 58

The sheriff arrested him and he languished in the local jail until he was tried and hanged on October 13, 1882. Like O.J. Simpson, Will denied killing Sid Vaughn and robbing Randall Bettis, and staunchly denied killing Aunt Betsy until the very end.

On the gallows, Will cussed and ranted about love and all the girls he was going to have to leave behind. When the noose was slipped around Will's neck, he turned to the hangman "Easy God damnit, you are choking me." 59

In 1990, an anonymous inquiry was made about Amanda Bland (September 22, 1856 - April 1, 1938) of Prince William County, a daughter of James P. Bland (c1810-1860) and Mary Lloyd (C1808-). Tax records show that the parents of James P. Bland were John Bland (C1782 -) and Mary Ann _____. John and Mary Ann had four sons, James, Robert, Benjamin and Arthur, names that match the patterns of this branch. AC 8-1, p. 8 and letter, Judith Roby Cash to Charles L. Bland, February 26, 1990. Similar inquiries surfaced in The Genealogy Forum during Spring 1999, but there has not been sufficient time to pursue them. Most interesting by far is my opening of a correspondence with Kevin Fraley following his announcement in GF, March 2, 1999. Kevin is descended from Mary Clementine Bland (April 2, 1856 -) of Bland Hollow in Cedar County Missouri. Her father was William H. Bland (June 1829 -) born in Perry County Illinois. William's father, "the patriarch of the Cedar County Blands, was John Daniel Bland (December 5, 1792 -)" born in Virginia. Note AC 11.2, pp. 26-33, that I previously classified John Daniel as a son of William Bland (C1765-1850) of Nelson and Hardin Counties. Cousin Fraley, however, states that John Daniel was the son of "Jacky" born about 1770 in Virginia. This is exciting news and opens up a full line, which at least I had not been aware of before. In the analysis that follows, I privilege the point of view of Kevin Fraley, who also wrote me on March 25, 1999, expressing his gratitude for

life in Virginia. He married Hanna Randle $(C1771-after\ 1820)^{76}$ in Fauquier County Virginia on December 1, 1788. According to a newly found cousin, Kevin Fraley of Seattle Washington. Jacky and Hannah had a family of eight children. 77

(4) Henry Lippincott (April 9, 1835 - November 5, 1892) born in Champaign County Ohio and died in Westminster, Allen County Ohio. Henry married (1st) Mary McPherron, (C1835-1861) about 1860. (2nd) Lydia Ann Clark (December 17, 1841 -August 1912) on November 25, 1862 in Urbana, Champaign County Illinois.

Marietta Lippincott (April 19, 1840 - February 22,

1870). Marietta married David McPherron.

THE BLANDS OF HARDIN AND NELSON CUNTIES KENTUCKY

Two distinct early Bland families in Kentucky descend from brothers Thomas Bland (1719-1788) of Fauquier County Virginia, whose descendants moved into the area of Louisville Kentucky as well as West Virginia, and whose son James moved directly to Hardin County Kentucky. John Bland (C1725-1795), younger brother of Thomas, left Prince William County Virginia around 1772 and tarried in Shenandoah County before moving on to Nelson County Kentucky where he died in 1795. 93

THE DESCENDANTS OF THOMAS BLAND, (1719-1788)

Thomas probably remained in Prince William County, but historical records show that he was from Fauquier County, which was formed in 1759 from Prince William. 94 Thomas's will and other evidence suggests that Thomas was married twice. The name of a first wife was unknown, but when his will was made, Thomas was married to a widow, Jane (probably) English Smith. There is no evidence when Jane was born, but she made her will in 1797 and it was probated July 25, 1802. 95 Unfortunately, this family never found an historian's voice. 96 Robert Linn Bland (1868-1957) from Weston West Virginia, was descended from Thomas' son Thomas (Page

Paragraph E below) and his daughter, the late Urilla Bland, did extensive research on the Bland family in general and was very influential to my own early research. I once claimed that Thomas' son James (page below, paragraph F) would be my adopted family, but alas, I have made a poor substitute for a devoted descendant. This is a family group that is in dire need of family researchers. When Thomas died, it is probable that he had the following children:

1. HENRY BLAND (C1741-1777). Henry, whose dates are speculative, is known by a 1777 transaction between himself and Thomas Bland, his father and by circumstantial evidence. In item G below, page , re Mildred Bland Hughes (Family of John Bland 1725-1795), there is speculation that Mildred may have been the widow of Henry Bland,

AC 3-1, p. 30; AC 7-2, p. 24. Jane's maiden name, English, is probable but not decisively proven. Mary Kathryn Harris and Mary Iva Jean Jorgensen, <u>James Stark of Stafford County and His Descendants</u> Vol 1. (1985), p. 274. Jane was the widow of Joseph Smith and the mother of Smith's children, including Weedon Smith, a distinctive name that later crops up in one of the the Bland families of Hardin County Kentcuky, as did an obvious close relationship with the English and Stark Families, who intermarried with the Smiths and to some extent with the Blands. William Sztark, for example, married Ann Smith, a daughter of Jane Smith Bland, and Susannah Styark, married James Bland, a son of Jane Smith Bland by Thomas Bland. Within the family of John Bland (1725-1795) David Stark, married Mildred Bland, a daughter of John's son Daniel Bland, (C1764-1838) and Elizabeth Hughes, who lived in Hardin County.

who moved to Nelson County, perhaps with John and Margaret and married William Hughes. In his will of October 5, 1795 97 John Bland specifies that Nancy Bland, daughter to Henry Bland, who married Robert Webb on March 30,1807, should have 20 pounds, to come from the share of Mildred Hughes. ⁹⁸ Over the years, we have come to understand that the reference to Henry Bland was in fact to this Henry (C1741-1777) the son of John's brother Thomas (C1719-1788). Very little is known about Henry. One of the challenges of our historical research would be to learn more about him.

2. JOSEPH BLAND (C1752-1820). The long standing story of Thomas Bland (C Below) and his demise at Winchester Virginia, has led me to hypothesize that Joseph is a son of Thomas Bland, though he is not mentioned in the 1788 will. This hypothesis has not been proven but no one has ever argued against it. I would of course, welcome a good argument or debate about this and would be glad to publish it in a subsequent issue of "Among Cousins".

Joseph moved to Winchester in Frederick County in western Virginia, where he married Susan Bailey Johnson. Susan died about 1798 and Joseph remarried to Eleanor Benton. 99 By Susan Bailey Johnson, had the following children, whose descendants were later found in nearby counties of West Virginia, Pennsylvania and some migrated to Ohio and Iowa. Kentucky was not a part of the migratory pattern of Joseph's children: 100

- A. Mary Bland (August 19, 1873 October 16, 1856), who married Jonah Baldwin (1773-1850), on March 17, 1803, in Greene County Pennsylvania.
- B. <u>CATHERINE BLAND</u> (C1785/86 1872) who married Samuel Sampson Frum about 1809.
- C. RICHARD BLAND (April 25, 1787 July 4, 1876), married Mary Jobes (January 25, 1795 January 21, 1851). On January 27, 1859, Richard married Sarah Harper.
- D. THOMAS BLAND (October 13, 1789 February 22, 1874). In 1812, Thomas married Elizabeth McCullough, (August 10, 1796 September 1, 1853). About 1854, Thomas married Sarah Devall.

- E. DAVID BLAND(July 25, 1792 December 25, 1874). David married Elizabeth Church (February 23, 1793 after 1870) about 1817.
- F. ELIZABETH BLAND married Peter Tenent.
- G. SARAH BLAND married Alexander Timmats.
- 3. ELIZABETH BLAND Elizabeth's dates are uncertain, but it is known that she received a bequest from her father in 1785 and was married to Spillsby Stone in Fauquier Virginia, when her father's will was made. Elizabeth died before 1799, a year when Spillsby Stone and his wife Frances made a land transaction with Thomas Chapman. About 1800, Spillsby Stone moved to Nelson County Kentucky.
- 4. NANCY BLAND Nancy married George Harding about 1785.
- 5. THOMAS BLAND (C1765-1792). Thomas married Sarah Byrne (1768-1831) in Fauquier County about 1785. Thomas was not one of the brighter stars in the Bland family constellation. In November 1792, with the onset of winter, he gathered up his wife Sarah, and two small sons John and Samuel, (Sarah was then pregnant with Thomas Bland 1793-1867) and struck out for Kentucky, via the Cumberland Gap!!! As it happened, fortunately for Thomas' wife and children, they tarried in <u>Winchester</u> Virginia, with relatives for a time before moving on. Presently, Thomas developed a raging fever and, unhappily for him, before he could find a doctor, came upon a slave who was carrying several buckets of water. Thomas besought the no doubt startled slave to pour three or four buckets of the cold water over his head. Wow! Three or four buckets! The slave, seeing a sure opportunity to lighten his load and perhaps to reduce the white citizenry by one, obliged young Tom, who promptly froze to death. Poor Tom! He was buried at Winchester, among his people, as they say. But stories like this have a happy ending. Fortunately, for all of Thomas and Sarah's descendants now living in Lewis County West Virginia, Sarah was several whits smarter than Tom. She might have pressed on into the wilderness. But she didn't. Rather, she turned back to her father's home in Prince William County, where she gave birth to Thomas Bland (1793-1867). After Thomas was born, Sarah returned to Monongalia County and married Jacob Zinn. 101 By Thomas Bland, Sarah Byrne had three sons: 102

- A. JOHN BUCKNER BLAND (1787-1868). Thomas moved to Louisville in Jefferson County Kentucky, where he married Ann Lewis Bridgeford (1798-1891) in 1820. John and Ann lived out their lives around Louisville. They had ten children, all of whom lived around Louisville Kentucky.
- B. SAMUEL BLAND (1790-1815). Evidently, Samuel did not marry.
- C. THOMAS BLAND (1793-1867) Thomas married Mary Newlon (1796-1879) on December 10, 1815, and they lived out their lives in Lewis County West Virginia. They had nine children, who lived in the Lewis County area.
- 6. JAMES BLAND (December 19, 1780 February 2, 1829) James was identified in his father's will as "my youngest son." He married Susannah Stark (March 3, 1783 September 17, 1852) in Fauquier County Virginia on July 19, 1800. About 1803, following the death of his mother, James divested property in Fauquier County Virginia and moved to Hardin County Kentucky. By 1810, Thomas and Susannah were well settled near Rhude's Creek, a branch of the Nolin River. James and Susannah were buried at the West Rhude's Creek Cemetery and had a fairly substantial family, who seem to have stayed fairly close to Hardin County. Their children were: 103
 - A. THOMAS BLAND (December 21, 1803 September 5, 1823)
 - B. <u>ELIZABETH BLAND</u>(C1806 1850/1860) married Richard Richards in Hardin County July 19, 1825.
 - C. HENRY BLAND (December 23, 1808 -August 31, 1881) married (a) Mariah English (August 11, 1809 June 4, 1834) on August 3, 1829, and (2) Alice Harding (January 18, 1810 November 15, 1880) on April 21, 1835. Both marriages occurred in Hardin County.
 - D. <u>JANE BLAND</u> (March 11, 1811 January 30, 1848) married Leonard Farmer in Hardin County, April 3, 1829.
 - E. SUSANNAH BLAND (C1814) married William Mather on July 12, 1831.
 - F. WILLIAM BLAND (September 10, 1813 February 17, 1861), married Adeline English (January 30, 1817 March 29, 1891) on May 4, 1835, in Hardin County.

- G. MARY ANN BLAND (December 29, 1817 August 29, 1876) married John English (December 24, 1813 March 24, 1877) on January 19, 1836 in Hardin County.
- H. MALINDA BLAND (March 4, 1819 July 29, 1886) married William Abel on November 24, 1839 in Hardin County.
- I. LUCRETIA BLAND (C1824-1865) married Elijah Hansborough on January 17, 1841. Hansborough's mother was Margaret Stark, sister of Lucretia's mother Susannah Stark. 104
- 7. CATHERINE BLAND Nothing further is known of Catherine.
- 8. MARY BLAND Following her father's death, Mary moved to Nelson County Kentucky and took up with her Uncle John Bland (1725-1795). She married Henry Higgins (who no doubt later married Eliza Dolittle. We have record of her damning his soul), on February 25, 1793.

DESCENDANTS OF JOHN BLAND (C1725-1795)

John was the youngest child we know of William Bland (C1686-1744) and his second wife Catherine Key. John was born in Prince William County Virginia. He married Margaret Osborne in Prince William County Virginia, about 1747 and they moved into the area of Jefferson County Kentucky that became Nelson County about 1781. John died in 1795. He and Margaret Osborne were parents of the following children: 105

- 1. OSBORNE BLAND (C1748-1820) married Letitia ... (C1752-after 1820) about 1768. Osborne and Letitia and the children who were born at that time, were involved in the ferocious Indian Raid at Fort Kinchloe in 1782. Osborne, Letitia, and at least their children Jesse and Moses were captured. Osborne was in captivity for three years, Jesse for twelve years. Letitia escaped after a short interval. The family remained in Nelson County, though they moved frequently. 106 By 1802, they were settled in Cumberland County Kentucky. They had the following children:
 - A. MARGARET BLAND (C1769-), who married William Phillips in Nelson County May 28, 1786. They had a family of six children. 107

- B. JOHN (C1770-1842), John married Sarah Lee, probably in Monroe/Greenbrier County Virginia about 1799. By 1804, the family was in Tennessee (location uncertain). By 1810, John was in Cumberland County Kentucky. He also for Cumberland County. appears in the 1820 census between, other children were born in Tennessee, indicating that John moved around a lot like his parents. It would appear that like his younger brother Osborne, he moved away with his children when the elder Osborne died. In the 1830 Census of Ray County Missouri. In 1840, he is in Livingston County, which was formed in 1837, derivative of Carroll and Ray County. The 1840 census of Livingston County also yields the names of three of John's older sons. Since Livingston and Carroll Counties came into being from Ray County between 1830-1840, it is reasonable to assume that this family stayed put while the county John and Sarah had a family lines changed. children: 108
 - (1) Abraham Blann (C1800 living in 1860/died by 1870)
 Abraham was born in Virginia and was in Livingston County Missouri in 1850. He married Hannah Runnels (C1813)¹⁰⁹ on January 31, 1833 in Ray County Missouri. They were in Livingston County, Dwelling 631 in the 1850 Census. Census takers recorded their names variously as Blan and Blann. Abraham and Hannah had a family of eleven children:
 - (a) <u>John W. Blann</u> (c1833-)
 - (b) Jasper N. Blann (c1836-)
 - (c) Martha L. Blann (C1838-) Martha married William Russell on December 8, 1853, and they were living with Abraham and Hannah as of the 18650 Census.

 - (e) Abram Blann (C1841-
 - (f) William Blann (c1844-)
 - (g) Hannah Blann (c1846-)
 - (h) Sarah Blann (c1849-

Curious that this name was in one source called Hannah Randles and might variously have been Reynolds. Interesting also that Jacky "John" Bland, above pp. 38-39 married Hannah Randles in Virginia.

Previous entries for John Bland and his family are found in AC 2-2, pp. 25-26; AC 3-1, pp. 8-9; AC 3-2, pp. 9-15; AC 4-1; pp. 20-21; AC 4-2, p. 30, AC 13, p. 43-44, esp. note 133. My reasons for placing John Bland in the family of Osborne Bland Sr. are found in AC 6-2, p. 13. The 1840 census information is found in a letter from Jack Blann to Otis Ray Blann et. al. August 16, 1976, updated September/October 1998. Mr. Blann's analysis is so interesting, particularly with its supplemental information from Ruby Blann of Lawrence Kansas, who supplied much of my original information but has not been in touch for years, that I'm extending this analysis to four generations.

- (1) Purmit Blann (C1804 November 15, 1861) Purmit's name is variously spelled Permit. Purmit was born in Tennessee. Purmit married Elizabeth Randles or Reynolds, (C1813-) in Ray County Missouri on July 2, 1831. They had a family of 13 children:
 - (a) John W. Blann (April 2, 1832 November 17, 1878). John married Mary Jane Gill (January 8, 1834 March 14, 1874), born in Ohio. John and Mary were in dwelling 568, right beside his parents, in 1850. They were married in Livingston County Missouri on April 21, 1850. They had eight children.
 - (b) Mary J. Blann (September 23, 1834 July 3, 1869), married Joseph Gill (1827-1899) on June 3, 1852 in Livingston County.
 - (c) Zachariah Blann (C1835- August 1863), married Isabell Gill (April 6, 1826 July 8, 1888) about 1852. They had seven children born between 1853-1864.
 - (d) Martha A. Blann (c1836-) married Owen Petty July 29, 1858.
 - (e) <u>Sarah Blann</u> (c1837 January 14, 1868) married Thomas Bryan April 7, 1862.
 - (f) Abraham Blann (c1839-
 - (g) Isaac Blann (c1841-)
 - (h) Jacob Blann (October 1844 May 2, 1872). He married Mary Porter, February 11, 1866.
 - (i) Nancy E. Blann (C1847) married David R. Johnson, February 1, 1866.
 - (j) Catherine Blann (C1848-)
 - (k) Thomas Blann
 - (1) Charles Blann
 - (m) Purmit Blann (-living 1883)

In AC 3-2, p. 11, I expressed the opinion that Rebecca and Jasper might be the children of Martha Blann and her husband William Russell.

Previously, Zachariah and Isabell had been shown with seven children. That may still be true, but Kathi Pittman E-mailed me that Zachariah had died in August 1863 and her granny Zackia Belle Blann was born October 10, 1863. That would make eight children. E-mail, Kathi Pittman to Charles L. Bland, July 6, 1999.

- (2) James Lee Bland (1809-1811) born in Tennessee.

- Mary Lee Bland (1817-1898) Much to her chagrin no (7)doubt, Mary was born in Cumberland County Kentucky, where her parents, by the time she was born, had settled in amongst their people. Mary Lee Bland married William Fletcher Ewell, (1815-1848) on November 30, 1834 in Carroll County Missouri. William fought in the Mexican-American War and was killed in action. Earlier, she and Ewell left Kentucky for Missouri and got caught up she Mormonism. Mary Lee claims that disinherited by her father for this, but Mary Lee was an unreliable historian. They had a family of six children.
- C. SARAH BLAND (C1773-) married James Willett in Nelson County Kentucky, December 20 or 21, 1790.
- D. OSBORNE BLAND JR. (1774-1849) Osborne was born in Prince William County Virginia, and moved into Greene County Indiana about 1838. He died in Richland Township, Greene County. Osborne married Patsy Donahoo (C1784-1847) in Nelson County on January 21, 1799. After Patsy died, Osborne fell in with the wrong crowd, including a woman

named Sally Kent Andrews, whom Osborne married on November 15, 1848 in Greene County. Less than three months later, Sally's son by another marriage, beat Osborne to death. Poor old Osborne. They say he really missed his Patsy, who gave him a family of twelve children: 112

- (1)William Bland (1801 - after 1860) married (1st) Martha Fisher (C1814 -) about 1835 and (2nd) Ann (C1820-). By 1850, William and Ann were in Shelby County Illinois. They had a family of five children. One of the sons of William Bland was William Austin Bland (1843-1924) who married Mary Lankford (1848-1916) on March William 14, 1865. was а Civil Veteran, serving with Company C, 43rd Indiana Regimental Infantry between 1863-1864. pleased to display a photo of William Austin Bland and Mary Lankford and five of their six children, on the following page.
- (2) Eli Bland (C1806 after 1850) was born in Kentucky. He married Sarah (C1811) about 1834. By 1850 they were in Shelby County Illinois. They had four known children.
- (3) John Bland (C1807-1840) married Mary Jane "Jency" Mahan (1809-1894). Mary Jane is buried in Clark County Illinois. John and Mary Jane had a family of four children. Jean Engle of

VU, pp. 441-451 and Ac 6-2, pp. 14-16 and AC 13, pp. 44-47 esp. p. 47. A genealogist, Dolores Rutherford, wrote me on June 15, 1996 regarding Margaret Bland, born December 11, 1799, who married John Kidwell in Monroe County Kentucky in 1820. Based on juxtaposition of Osborne Bland Jr. and Patsy Donohoo and their children in the 1810 and 1820 censuses of Cumberland County, Dolores suggested that Margaret might be a first child of Osborne and Patsy (I had earlier suggested that she would be the daughter of Osborne's brother Warren. I think there might be something to Dolores' hunch. There is a Margaret Bland already among their children, but if anyone is interested in following the logic of this placement back to AC 1-1, pp. 8-9, the logic is not exceedingly powerful. Our knowledge of the family of Osborne and Patsy was primarily stitched together by descendants of the line, especially the late Virginia Bland Cowden, whose information was passed on to me while I was writing <u>VU</u>. I would be interested in seeing if something develops from this inquiry.

One of the sons of William Bland was Moses (1844-1907), who married Elizabeth Langford, (1850-1914) on July 28, 1866. Moses served in the same Infantry outfit as his brother William Austin Bland. Military records of William Austin and Moses were supplied by Laverne Bland. They were great grandparents of Laverne Bland of Edgerton Missouri and Dee Bland Sellars of Joliet Illinois, who also are great grandchildren of Moses' cousin Osborne Bland (1853-1923) and his wife, Sarah L. Matthews, whom he married on October 12, 1873. Osborne is a son of Jessie Bland. Fathers Jesse and William are sons of Osborne Bland (1774-1849) and Patsy Donohoo. This information is discussed in AC 1-2, pp. 8-10, and photos of Moses and Elizabeth and Osborne are attached to that Newsletter. CF VU, pp. 444-445 and 447-448 and AC 13, pp. 45-46.

Huram Dow Bland married Obediance (previously called Obediah), (1813-1877) Brazil in 1829 and with her had the following children:

Jeremiah Hunley, (C1814-1865) whom she married December 3, 1838. 152 Jeremiah Hunley and Sarah Bland Barlow had a family of six children. 153 The following concerns the life of their youngest child.

THE LITTLE DRUMMER BOY: Whether it came from Sarah Bland Barlow or her husband Jeremiah Hunley is not clear, but their children seemed to have a deep reserve of feistiness. Stories about the family have various sources, but none perhaps more compelling that Sarah and Jeremiah's last child, Annie Hunley (March 12, 1853 - February 6, 1929), whose life story, though very Victorian in its tone, contains enough to betray a life of pain and suffering, as well as sacrifice and love, for Annie and those around her.

When the Civil War broke out, Annie was one of five living children. Not unsual for Kentucky, the family was divided in its loyalties. While two brothers, Thomas and Hiram joined the Confederacy, an older brother Archibald (1840-1918), and Jeremiah himself, fought with the Union. Archibald Hunley was dishonorably discharged following a courts-martial on January 25, 1863, for alleged insubordination. Archibald apparently told his sergeant not to hurt another man. It was compounded by a spiteful officer in charge, who indicted Archibald falsely for being AWOL. Archibald was convicted but fought this verdict for 26 years before the Fifty First Congress in 1891 invalidated the court martial conviction and Awarded Archibald a pension and all due back pay. 154

Annie herself was a girl of eight when Union Troops moved through Hardin County, rounding up volunteers and conscripts to help in the looming battles that would unfold at Mill Springs Kentucky, Forts Donelson and Henry Tennessee, February 6-16, 1862, and ultimately Shiloh. The Union Soldiers came for Jeremiah Hunley, whose wife had died and his sons were off fighting. Recently Confederate soldiers had burned his house down. Jeremiah told the soldiers he would go with them, providing they also took along his "little boy" Tom. Jeremiah had hastily dressed Annie in boy's

clothes and told her that hereafter she would be Tom Hunley and they would stay together, no matter what. A handsome Union lieutenant named Devoe accepted the proposition and put Tom to work as a drummer boy for his outfit. Jeremiah and Annie, known to everyone as Tom Hunley the drummer boy served the Union this way for two years (dates are imprecise but probably 1861 to 1863/1864).

Presently General Grant himself inspected Annie's unit and demanded that Lieutenant Devoe separate "Tom" who looked too young and frail to serve. As Annie wrote it, Jeremiah Hunley called General Grant aside and explained the situation to him. Grant agreed to the masquerade and hearing stories of Jeremiah and Annie's bravery, promised them recognition after the war. One line that Grant supposedly spoke about Annie speaks in the starkest terms of the horror of war that visits every soldier in combat: "You say she fought her way for two years, walking over the battlefields with her little feet red with blood, beating the drum without fear."

Jeremiah Hunley and Annie moved to Indiana shortly after the end of the Civil War, where Jeremiah died, leaving Annie alone. To provide for her care and well being, Jeremiah made a last dreadful misjudgment in pledging her to marry a much older man and no-good drunk named Joe Dalton. In Bland history, this lout deserves a place in infamy along with Will Austin (1857-1882), Giles Bland (1647-1676), Hiram Bland (1825-1851), the serial man-killer Mariah Bland (1841-) (notice how they all died young except Mariah who struck such deep dread and fear in the men around her that they rightly thought they either lived or got close to her). 155 Annie had fallen in love with Lieutenant Devoe from the war years, whom she met up with in Indiana. Devoe clasped Annie to his breast and launched into a long winded Victorian soliloguy which begins "Annie, Annie, my own love. . " and in the middle somewhere, "I am selfish Annie. I want you away from all the world . . . " etc etc. telling her that at home, she will be his Tom but to the world she will be Annie Devoe. Annie fainted before Devoe got to this part and when she revived she told him sadly, "Mr. Devoe, I regret to inform you that before he died, my much lamented late father promised my hand in marriage to Mr. Joseph Dalton and in fact we are already wed." "Oh." Said Colonel Devoe and went away "pale as death." 156 This must have been about 1867. Annabell Huber indicates that Annie gave birth out of wedlock to a boy named Charles Thomas Hunley on February 27, 1868. 157 Whether this is so, or whether Annie simply gave Charles her maiden name after her horrible experiences with Dalton is unknown. According to Annie's story, however, Dalton was utterly brutal to her, an alcoholic who forced

her to work or beg for money and beat her cruelly when she came home empty handed. Once, he picked up the baby and threw him across the room. A few months after the baby was born, Dalton grabbed Annie by the hair and was about to cut her throat with a razor when a policeman stayed his hand and sent Annie briefly to a safehouse. There, the mistress got-up Annie and the baby up in black face and spirited them past Dalton to the train station where they headed for Cincinatti Ohio. Dalton evidently met his end when, following on their heels, he fell down drunk across a track (neat huh?) and a moving train settled his hash.

Annie wrote this story in 1899 and picked it up briefly in 1873, when she is living a life of deprivation and hardship with son in Cincinnati in 1873. Briefly five-year-old mysteriously, she again meets with now Colonel Devoe, who rescues her boy from a latch-key arrangement, takes her in his arms and proclaims "Be still my love." Devoe goes on about his love for her and ends with "You're free, you're mine." This is about 1873, unhappily for us, Annie is silent about the intervening 26 years. Did she marry Devoe? Evidently not. Rather, she married a Danish man, Paul Glud (1853-1931) and they moved to Oakland California. They had no children, but evidently took in orphan children, out of memory of the dark days of the Civil War when Annie and her father were driven from their shattered home, and the days with Joe Dalton She actually wrote her account of 1899 to raise after the war. money for an orphanage. 158 Annie Hunley Dalton (Devoe?) Glud. What a gal. She must have been one of the first women to learn to drive a car. I am pleased to display below, an artist conception of Annie "Tom" Hunley in battle, and a photo of Annie at the wheel with her three brothers as passengers, now happily reconciled from their family discord in the war between the states.

THE DESCENDANTS OF JOHN BLAND, (1742-1807)

The distinctive family of Blands who settled in the part of Nelson County that in 1792 became Washington County Kentucky Was, we believe, headed by John Bland (C1742-1807), the son of John Bland (C1688-1763) of Prince William County Virginia. Though we have been able to define approximate dates for John, his life was something of a mystery. Transactions involving his wife Rachel begin to appear in Washington County in 1794 and the last is in 1799, causing historians of the family to believe she died that year. John and Rachel had the following six children: 162

1. ROLLY BLAND (C1763 - June 25 1825) Rolly was born in Virginia and has been certified as a soldier in the American Revolution. He married (1st) Delsey Shekklesworth (- C1823) 163 in Washington County Kentucky on October 2, 1798 and (2nd) Sarah Thomas on October 24 or 30, 1825. Rolly's children were: 164

This indicates that William Bland and Sarah Peake had a family of 16 children. I should indicate that is not a well researched line. I gained some information from visits to the Filson Club and Kentucky State Library in August 1985 as well as visiting two old and abandoned cemeteries with had the tombstones for William and Sarah and some of their children. Some of the names assigned as children of William and Sarah are speculative. This is a line that needs an historian.

The actual record refers to her as "Delsey Worth" with her father listed as John Shecklesworth. Kathy Hembree, Kokomo Indiana, philly@netusal1.net, in a posting to Genealogical Forum, March 11, 1999, and E-mail, Kathy Hembree to Charles L. Bland, March 12 and 14, 1999, states that the formal name of the family was Shuttlesworth, but listed ten variations. She also listed five Shuttledworth women who married in Washington County Kentucky between 1811-1822, and suggested that Nay Shuttlesworth C1771-1850), who married Kenellum Murphy in Washington County about 1796, might have been the sister of Delsey and Rachel Jean/Jenny. Its interesting to note this, but the two women who married Rolly and Samuel Bland are generally known as Shekklesworth, and for our purposes, consistency of indexing if nothing else, its probably better to keep it that way.

THE BLANDS OF PULASKI COUNTY KENTUCKY

FAMILY AND DESCENDANTS OF REUBEN BLAND

<u>REUBEN BLAND</u> (c1790-1843) Reuben's family origins have stubbornly resisted discovery. He was found in southern Kentucky first in Wayne County and later in Pulaski County, formed in 1799 by Green

and Lincoln Counties. Wayne County was formed in 1801 from Pulaski. 173 Reuben's approximate dates are (1780/1790- 1843/1850) Reuben was last found in public records in 1843. 174 His birthplace is uncertain but according to an application for a marriage license completed by his daughter Neptha, he was born in Virginia.

Reuben served in the Wayne County 90th Regiment of Kentucky Militia in the War of 1812, under Captain Shrewsbury. 175 As early as 1813, Reuben was on the tax rolls of Wayne County. 176 Reuben married Dicey West (C1790- after 1850) in Wayne County Kentucky on or about February 1, 1814. 177 Earlier, Reuben and Dicev lived on an eighty-acre plot on Forbus Watercourse in Pulaski County. All of his children were born there. After Reuben's death in the 1840s, Dicey and four of her daughters (Easter, Margaret, Polly A. and Neptha) lived with George G. and Huldah Murphy and their children in Casey County. After the 1850 census, Dicey has not been found. By 1853/1854, all of Reuben and Dicey's children except William (C1815-1879), who remained in Pulaski County, had left Casey County for a of Hardin, Grayson and Breckenridge Counties. Reuben Bland and Dicey West were parents of the following children:

1. <u>WILLIAM BLAND</u> (C1815-1879) William was born in Pulaski County and was there in 1850 and appears to have remained there. William married (1st) Pheraby Burton (1816-1875) on August 13, 1835 in Wayne County. and (2nd) Eliza Dagley (C1840-) on December 17, 1876. Eliza remarried to William T. Floyd on February 28, 1880. With Pheraby Burton, William had the following children: 178

The primary researcher with whom I have had contact regarding this line is Pansy Lea Willburn of San Modesto California, who provided the original material for A Vision of Unity and submitted to me "Reuben Bland of Wayne and Pulaski Counties, Kentucky," about March 15, 1999, hereafter called Willburn. In what follows, I yield to Willburn's expertise on this family line and accept her modification of minor variances in dates and names, and her definition of this family's surname as Bland, rather than Blan, as it has been called inter alia. If significant differences exist, I accept Willburn's interpretation and cite the previous information. I have also been aided by insights provided by Leah McCathy of Mobile Alabama and Joseph R. Van Bogart of Louisville Kentucky, I am grateful for the continuing interest in this line by these historians.

 - I. THOMAS BLAND (C1862 1881) Born in Grayson County, died in Wright County Missouri.
- 8. MARGARET BLAND (C1831-) Margaret was born in Pulaski County. In 1850, Margaret was in the home of G.G. Murphy in Casey County. She married Jesse Soman (or Loman) on February 18, 1855.
- 9. MARY A. "POLLY" BLAND (C1834/1835). By 1850 Mary lived with her mother and sisters in the home of the George C. Murphy family in Casey County, Kentucky. Mary married Henry Eaden in Breckenridge County, November 30, 1854. Henry was probably the brother of Nancy Eaden who married Mary's brother Robert.
- 10. <u>NEPTHA BLAND</u> (C1838/1840) Also born in Pulaski County, Kentucky, Neptha also lived in Casey County with her mother and sisters at the Murphy home in 1850. Neptha married Ancil Snelling in Breckenridge County on October 22, 1863. She later married a man named Nugent. Neptha was called Neppy.

BLANDS OF BEAUFORT, BERTIE, CRAVEN, EDGECOMBE, MARTIN AND PITT COUNTIES NORTH CAROLINA

COUNTY GENEALOGY

There is a family or multiple families of Blands, in this general area of North Eastern North Carolina, which has not been adequately researched. Although heretofore, perhaps because they are not well understood, they have been identified with one or another county it is clear upon even this cursory closer look that they were scattered and intermingled throughout the several counties identified above.

Beaufort and Craven Counties were formed in 1712 from Bath County.

Bertie County was formed in 1722 from Chowan County.

Edgecombe County was formed in 1741 from Bertie County.

Martin County was formed in 1774 from Halifax and Tyrell Counties.

Pitt County was formed in 1760 from Beaufort County.

<u>JOHN ANTHONY BLAND</u> (c1728 -) In the Craven County Court minutes of February 4, 1883, appears a case involving John Anthony Bland, Controller of the Office Of Kings Duties at "Beaucdire" whose son John Charles Bland was found dead with a Miss Victorie DuCartal Du Castel killed at New Bern North Carolina on October 9 and 10 1782. John Charles Bland was married to Jean Chabert on August 21, 1770 and they had three children, including Peter, Augustus and Cesar Bland.

The relationship of this John Anthony Bland to any of the other Blands in this area is unclear and doubtful. His title would suggest that he was an Englishman working abroad in, as it were, the King's Colonies, though the date suggests considerable ambiguity about his status as an agent of the King of England.

THOMAS (c1714-1780). BLAND Between 1779-1784, lists of Bearers in Pitt County included George Bland (see George Bland 1734-1797, pp 98ff below), John Bland, William Bland and Thomas Bland. Information about this line is sketchy and badly connected, sometimes confused, so I stress that what is written is suggestive and hypothetical, intended as no more than a clue to further work, and the clue itself may be wrong. As early as 1740, a Thomas Bland was summoned to give evidence in court in Bertie County. 187 There was property in Bertie County owned by Blands as early as 1739 and 1741. Thomas made his will on June 27, 1772, but it was not probated until 1780, suggesting that Thomas died toward the later time. Elements of information that bear on the ages of two of his sons, William and Thomas, suggest that Thomas himself was born no later than 1714. Bare essentials of Thomas's life found in his will show a wife named Judith, and children who included: 189

- 1. <u>WILLIAM BLAND</u> (c1735-before 1804) In the 1790 census, William appears in a household with an adult male, three males under 16 and five females. ¹⁹⁰ In 1765, William appears as witness to deeds in Edgecombe County. ¹⁹¹ William acquired 100 acres in Town Creek in 1770. ¹⁹² That this William Bland had a son named William is suggested by the fact that a younger William was surveying property of the older William in 1787 and 1804.
- 2. THOMAS BLAND (C1736- February 1791) This Thomas Bland witnessed a Will of Hardy Brown in Halifax County that was made out December 1, 1772 and probated July 1774. He also witnessed the will of Jesse Bryan that was probated September 6, 1786. ¹⁹⁴ In the 1790 census, Thomas is found with an adult male, one male under 16 (I suggest he is Thomas, below, and three females. ¹⁹⁵ Thomas made out his will in Martin County, January 24, 1791 and it was probated in March 1791. ¹⁹⁶ This Thomas is found with a wife Sarah and children:
- A. JOHN BLAND (C1757) John was a Chain Bearer in Pitt County between 1779-1784. On October 1, 1778, John claimed 200 acres located near a man named Luke Robertson in Martin County, and another 150 acres near Robertson and Hardy Keel. This was part of three grants surveyed for John on May 19, 1787 totaling 609 acres. One of the chain bearers in this transaction was a man named Stephen Blan (John spelled his name Bland). He is found in the 1790 census with one adult male and three females. I cannot prove it, but believe John was the father of:
- (1) Thomas Bland (C1791-1862) I am suggesting that this Thomas married (1st) Sally $_$ (C1795-1854) about 1817 by whom he had:

STEPHEN BLAND/BLAN (C1772 - after 1808) Stephen seems alternately to have spelled his name Blan, as when he acted as Chain Bearer for the property of John Bland in 1787. 199 was the first Bland found in Beaufort County North Carolina. He appears to belong to the third generation of Blands found in this area. He did not appear in the 1790 Census but was found in the 1800 census of Craven County aged 26-45. On January 27, 1794, Stephen Bland bought 100 acres along Durham Creek, in Beaufort County. He bought land along Durham's Creek in 1796 and received a land grant on Durham's creek in 1798. 1808 of land in conveyed these tracts Stephen Robertson, neighbor of John Bland of Martin County (A. above) Stephen may have married a woman named Penelope who is found in the 1850 Census of Craven County, aged 63.

GEORGE BLAND (c1734-1797)²²⁵ The progenitor of a major family in this area, whose origins are unknown, was George Bland who was an adult in Beaufort County North Carolina (Later Pitt County) 1758, and whose dates are reckoned to be C1734-1797. probably married twice. He married a woman whose name is not known by 1757. This first wife died by 1762. 227 George remarried to a woman named Prudence, who appears in the 1800 census. Prudence was probably the mother of his third son (see note 4, below) and may have been named Tison. ²²⁸ George was enumerated in the 1790 Census for Pitt County, New Bern District with two males over 16, two females and three slaves. 229 By 1775, he had a family composed of females and three slaves. By 1775, he had a family composed of himself and a wife, an older male, (perhaps George Jr.) two small sons and three daughters and a slave. Their graves are in Sampson County North Carolina and nothing further is known about (Gottschalk 15). No one has ever researched George's daughters. The sons include:

George deeded 200 acres of land in Pitt County to his son Theophilus on October 24, 1796. Gottschalk, p. 6, suggests that George was preparing to retire and charge Theophilus with his care. George does not appear in the 1800 Census, thus my suggestion that he died about 1797 and his dates are C. 1734-1797. It is located north of Craven, New Hanover and Duplin Counties. A fire in 1858 destroyed all of Pitt County's Wills. One of the intriguing possibilities of this family is that it is linked to the family of James Bland (C1704-1774) of New Hanover/Duplin County, and adjacent to an unidentified group of Blands in Martin County North Carolina, for whom I have never found any descendants, but no supporting evidence of this has been found.

Gottschalk, p. 4, shows a tax list for Pitt County in which George Bland is living in a household with two other white males, suggesting his first wife had died before that time.

Gottschalk shows that in 1800 Prudence was living alone near Theophilus Bland and George and Benjamin Tison. Letter, Julia Watkins to Charles Bland, September 10, 1996. Julia cites the 1800 census, p. 279. Hereafter this letter is referred to as Watkins.

- 2. JOHN BLAND (C1762-1823) married twice. John was found in the 1790 Census with an adult male, a male under 16 and three ²³⁰The name of his first wife, who died between 1810/1820, is unknown. His second wife, head of a household in 1830, aged 30-40 was named Sarah (C1788 - after 1850). appears from the ages of his sons and county records that George was not married until after 1790. In the 1800 Census, John is married with a wife in his same age bracket, 26-45. He has two females over 10 and five females under ten. Thus if John was not married until after 1790, he was quite busy during the decade. By 1810, John's household included himself and a wife, one son over 16, two sons under 16, four females over 16, one female 10-16 and 2 under 10.
 - A. GEORGE BLAND (C1795-) who was 21 by 1816. Though nothing is proven, I have previously suggested that the absence of further transactions by this George Bland suggests that he is the same man who turned up in Hopkins County in Western Kentucky to marry Margaret Ramsey in 1822, before moving into the Tennessee territory between 1826-1830 and from thence to Illinois.

Sarah, in the 1850 Census was living in the household of a son Theophilus Bland (1821-1902) see below, p. .

Gottschalk, p. 3, shows a tax list in which John's father George is found living alone in 1764. Thus it would appear his first wife was dead and he was not yet remarried to his second wife. John Bland is listed as security for an application for land by George Bland October 8, 1783, Gottschalk p. 5, which would suggest he was born no later than 1762. This would give the appearance that John was the son of George's first wife, and that perhaps she died as a result of his birth. John is identified in the 1810 Census as 45 or older. There is evidence of continuous possession of land in Pitt County by John, from 1797-1819. He is listed in Pitt County in 1820. In 1830 he is no longer listed.

George received from his father John, 200 acres of land in Pitt County per a deed dated February 16, 1816, which he resold to John on December 29, 1817, per Gottschalk pp. 14-15. Doris Bland of Fairfield Illinois wrote to me in 1982 about her husband's ancestor George Bland (C1795 - May 28, 1868) who was born either in Virginia, North Carolina or Kentucky and died in Wayne County Illinois. George married Sarah Givins in 1817 in Hopkins County Kentucky. On February 12, 1822, George married Margaret Ramsey (February 11, 1801 - April 8, 1887) in Hopkins County Kentucky. George and Margaret moved to the Tennessee purchase and lived there for four years from about 1826-1830, before moving on to Illinois. Their children were a son Robert and a daughter Susan, born in Kentucky. A son James Nathaniel Bland (January 14, 1828 - February 9, 1915), was born at Obion County in the Northwestern corner of Tennessee and died in Wayne County Illinois. James married Nancy Malinda Shaw at Wayne County Illinois on August 3, 1848. Their first child was George Bland, (June 3, 1849 - July 11, 1925) born and died in Wayne County. George married America Poe (April 2, 1853 - February 26, 1890), on February 11, 1870. From this marriage was born Elmer Bland (1886-1972) who married Gladys Caroline Sutton (1848-1890) on September 23, 1922, at Peoria Illinois. Their son was Elmer Francis Bland (1924-) who married Doris Ellen Bland. Later, George and Margaret Ramsey Bland moved to Fairfield Illinois, where children George, Elizabeth and William Bland were born.

Pitt County until about 1893, when they moved to Epworth, in Craven County North Carolina. They were members of the Epworth Methodist Church and James operated a country store in both Pitt and Craven counties. Jim's grand-daughter Doris Bland Sawyer relates a story of how Jim pioneered for his family in the use of an anti-itch medicine called Wicki, which had the exact opposite effect of inflaming his itch and diffusing it, causing him to race around like Snyder's hound yelling "mammy, get the grease." I am pleased to display a photo of James Lanier Bland below.²⁴⁹

Theophilus and Sarah moved to Shelby County Tennessee, between 1825/1830 and were enumerated in the 1830 census. They were accompanied by five sons who had married women from Pitt County. Theophilus and Sarah and their children lived out their life in Shelby County Tennessee and Theophilus is buried at the Bland cemetery in Shelby County. Their children were:

Bernice Taylor Cargill and Brenda Bethea Connelly Ed., (Memphis Tennessee 1989), hereafter referred to as Cargill and Connelly, states that the Bland cemetery is off the Kate Bond Road on Deerfield Trace.

Known as John Jr. because of his uncle John (1762-1823), John probably moved to Shelby County with his brothers. A John Bland married Nancy Wheeler on July 5, 1836, with William H. Bland (John's brother) as bondsman, Gottschalk, pp. 26, 39. Theophilus' family is discussed in Gottschalk, pp. 32-45 passim. It is possible that this is the same Jonathan N. Bland, ancestor of Mary Gilliam Gatlin of Fayetteville Tennessee, who was born in North Carolina, went to Virginia and thence to Tennessee, who died in Texas while visiting a son, William Perry Bland. Jaonathan married Lucy Ann Tuley, a Tennessee woman, and by her had: 1. James H. Bland, a minute man in the Civil War who died in Virginia; 2. Jonathan Frank Bland; 3. Eli Alexander Bland. John Bland, 1796/1798 may also have married Elizabeth Massey in Shelby County Tennessee in 1848. AC 3-2, pp. 41-42 and 4-1, pp. 27-28.

The disparity between the ages of Wyatt and Jessie and the latter two children indicates that Sarah was Hyland Bland's second wife and that he was previously married to a daughter of Wyatt Moore, with whom he had many land transactions. ²⁶⁷

These correspondents seem to be confusing "Sallie Bell" with Sarah Bland, (1845-1934) daughter of Hyland, who married N.D. or Johnson Reece and later married John Henry Kuhl. Interestingly, there was a second family of Blands, descended from Jesse Bland (C1775-1833) of Amherst County Virginia and his wife Sally Newman, some of whom settled in Shelby County about the same time as the Pitt County North Carolina Blands. Jesse is the son of John or Charles Bland from Amherst County Virginia, who were born no later than 1745 and would have been the approximate age of George Bland (1734-1797). There is, however, no extant proof of a close family relationship.

BLANNS/BLANDS OF DALLAS COUNTY ALABAMA

(MAYBE FROM NORTH CAROLINA)

By 1850, two distinctive Bland families lived in Dallas County Alabama. One was headed by Elza Bland (1798-1879), a descendant from the Edgefield County South Carolina Family 279 Elza moved to Alabama with his first wife, Sphia Pow, about 1835. In 1842, Elza and about 1863, Elza remarried to Damaris Barnes (C1806-) married Sarah L. Neyland, (C1845-1916). By 1850, Elza is found in the Census of Dallas County, (he moved there sometime between 1825 and 1835) with Damaris, a son Elza (1830-1854) who evidently never married, and a son Francis M. Bland (October 18, 1841-) who was born in Mississippi. 280 All his other children had moved away. Elza's property in 1870 was valued at about \$24,000.

the family had second major branch of its name consistently spelled Blann. The founders of this family were four or five siblings whose parents are unknown. 282 They were:

Bland, July 17, 1998, hereafter called Carrie Scales Evans, identifies a William Bland who married Mary DaCosta and applied for land in Burke County Georgia, c1765. Cousin Carrie attaches excerpts from Chatham County Georgia Deed Book G, which attest to Abraham DeCosta deeding five lots of land to the widow Mary Bland on April 14, 1789. Mary redistributed this land on April 22, 1789, including a reserve provision that her daughter Ann Bland would receive one of the lots in case of death of the primary recipient. "Another report," according to Cousin Carrie, is that he arrived in Burke County with one child, who may have been the William Bland Jr. (C1765-1792) who married Elizabeth Gavin (C1760-1797). All of this would seem to establish parameters for the elder William at about 1740-1789. This

- 1. STEPHEN BLANN (1782- before January 21, 1858) Stephen appeared in the 1850 Census of Dallas County Alabama as aged 68, born in North Carolina, living alone at a place called Rascoe Beat. He was employed as an overseer and was illiterate. Previous research about this family indicates that Stephen was in Jasper County Georgia as late as 1818. 284 It is commonly assumed by researchers in this family that Stephen is the eldest of the siblings who moved into Dallas County. The 1850 Census notation that he was from North Carolina, (the younger siblings were from Georgia) gives rise to the possibility that this family stemmed from the Eastern North Carolina family discussed above who were scattered throughout Bertie, Beaufort, Craven, Edgecombe, Martin and Pitt Counties. But there is no proof. The Stephen Blan who appears in the North Carolina family was still there in 1808, while Stephen's family appears to have left North Carolina for Georgia in 1782-1784. The name of Stephen's wife is uncertain, but he must have married about 1801/1802, and his wife's name may have been Martha Raynor or Rayner, who did not appear with Stephen in the 1850 Census. Stephen's Children were:

She married (2nd) William Bland in Dallas County on February 16, 1853. William was probably a second cousin, the son of Thomas Bland (C1801 after 1860) below, p. 124. Louisiana married (3rd) William B. Matthews(1841-1881) in Sumter County Alabama on October 26, 1860. By William Blann, Louisiana had a daughter

William Jr. would then be the half-brother of the siblings identified below, or perhaps the half-brother of the older siblings, Stephen and Tabitha and possibly James, and the father of Silas and Thomas. Here we begin stretching for the truth with maybe and perhaps and prudence says reign it in. In the last analysis, we don't know for sure.

- F. MARY ANN BLANN (c1830-) Mary Ann married William Fancher, (C1817-) in Dallas County on January 28, 1847. (c1830-) Mary Ann married William She and Fancher moved to Wilcox county in 1848.
- 2. TABITHA BLANN (1784- after 1857) Tabitha was born in Georgia and was in Jasper County in 1818. She married Henry Averytt (- 1856) about 1807 and they lived in Jasper County Georgia and Dallas County Alabama. Tabitha was declared mentally incompetent on November 21, 1857.
- 3. JAMES BLANN (c1780/1790) James was found in neighboring Wilcox county Alabama in the 1830 Census. He had a wife, aged 30-40, two daughters aged 10-15 and one aged 15-20. Though no sons were listed, by 1850, two males Monroe Blann (C1822-) a grocery keeper, born in Alabama, was enumerated in the household of James F. Hart, also a grocery keeper. OTHER NORTH CAROLINA BLANDS

DUPLIN COUNTY NORTH CAROLINA

Among Cousins, Volume 14, was given over entirely to an analysis of the Duplin County North Carolina family descended from William Bland (1748-1816), whose lineage goes back through a father William (1726-1775), a grandfather James (C1707-1774), a great grandfather William (C1686-1744) to the immigrant settler James Bland (C1661-1709). Surprisingly, feedback and criticism of Volume 14 has been slight if anything at all. I would still welcome criticism and corrections of what I wrote, but for this issue, will eschew any attention to that line.

Instead I will turn to William Bland's brother James (C1749-1799) whose prolific family has been discussed at length previously. 321 James and the woman we presume to have been his wife, Bethsheba (Barshaby) had five sons and seven daughters.

In this issue, we are especially interested in his son William Bland (C1787-after 1870), who married Elizabeth McBain (C1789-after 1873 on January 2, 1813. Like his other siblings, William left Chatham County North Carolina to Orange and Greene Counties in Indiana. It should be noted that Bland families from two stems settled in Greeene County by 1830, one from Chatham County N orth Carolina and the other from Nelson/Cumberland County Kentucky. Of particular interest are two of these boys: James Otis Daniel Bland and Enoch Bland.

- 1. JAMES OTIS DANIEL BLAND (April 7 or 24, 1824 September 2, 1908). James was born in Greene County Indiana and died in Cloud County Kansas. He was a Civil War Veteran, serving in 1863-1864 with Bryan's Company A, 115th Indiana Regiment, Volunteer Infantry, formed in Greene County. His unit engaged and defeated the Johnny Rebs at Blue Springs Tennessee in 1863. James re-enlisted March 16, 1865 in Terre Haute Indiana and served to August 7, 1865 with Company C, 156th Regiment, Indiana Volunteer Infantry. James married (1st) Sarah Elrod (C1827 September 1, 1859) 324 in Greene County Indiana, on September 4, 1845. James and Sarah were parents of six children:
 - A. JOHN BLAND (1847- After January 25, 1865) John enlisted with the 59th Indiana Volunteers and died of a fever in service. Lisa Ober provided several letters to James O.D. Bland, from John, the last dated January 25, 1865. Sadly then, John died in the very waning days of the war.
 - B. MARTHA J. BLAND (c1850) Martha married a Mr. Calvert.
 - C. WILLIAM F. BLAND (c1852)

The information that follows depends to a great extent on several letters written to me by Jack Bland, Portland Oregon, between 1994-1996, hereafter called Jack Bland File. Jack Bland found one record that showed William Bland (1787-after 1870) was in Clark County Indiana Territory as early as 1807. I am inclined, however, to think that this was William Bland (C1786-1828) a brother of James Bland (1773-1832) of the Randolph County N.C. family, AC 10-1, p. 28.

James O.D. Bland and Sarah Elrod appear in the 1850 Census of Greene County Indiana, in Dwelling 995, with children John and Martha.

James O.D. Bland and his family are discussed in AC 11-1, pp. 18-24. Additional information is derived from material sent to me by Lisa Ober, Huntsvville Texas, hereafter called Ober File.

D. SUSAN CATHERINE BLAND (March 6, 1854 - February 16, 1949) Called Kate, Susan was born in Greene County Indiana and died in Enid Oklahoma. Susan moved with her father to Kansas, where she became a school teacher. One of her grand daughters remembered her as having "a ramrod straight posture, her sense of human and intelligence, she was such a vocal person with grace and gallantry in the face of increasing age." She married (1st) Charles Harrison Dolan (November 2, 1838 - April 6, 1901) in Concordia Kansas on March 25, 1875 327 and (2nd) Mr. Rhodes. Susan is buried at Lamont, in Grant County Oklahoma, in Potter's Field. Charles Dolan and Susan Bland had three children. I am pleased to display in the space below a photograph of Susan Catherine Bland.

After Sarah Elrod's death in 1859, James O.D. Bland married Mary Gentry, (May 9, 1839 - July 6, 1911) on April 5, 1860. On April 8, 1873, James O.D., Mary and both their mothers 330 and eight children arrived at Buffalo, Concordia Kansas. James was a model Kansas pioneer, a prosperous farmer in spite of a severe grasshopper plague in his first year at Concordia, politician, orator and church man, contributing to construction of the county courthouse between 1886-1888 and served as an Elder in the First Presbyterian Church which James helped to construct. James was a Representative from Cloud County for the Kansas Legislature in 1889.

James and Mary Gentry had a family of ten children: 331

- G. <u>LUCINDA BLAND</u> (C1861) Lucinda is listed in the 1870 census, age 9.
- H. SARAH ANN BLAND (October 20, 1862 1930) Sarah was born in Greene County Indiana and died in Cloud County Kansas. Sarah married (1st) George Biggs and (2nd) Jeff Eakins. She is buried with George Biggs at the Pleasant Hill Cemetery in Concordia.
- I. DANIEL ERVIN BLAND (May 9, 1866 November 20, 1949)

 Daniel was born in Greene County Indiana and died in Cloud County Kansas. He is buried at Fairview Cemetery in Concordia. Daniel married a Michigan girl, Flora

Family legend has it that William Bland abandoned Elizabeth McBain and ran off with a younger woman, sometime between 1860 and the 1873 date noted in the text, which is why poor Elizabeth was tagging along with James O.D. Bland and his brood. I should note that if Census reports were accurate, as late as 1870, Elizabeth was not living with James O.D. and his wife Mary gentry, although Mary Gentry's mother was. 1870 Census Record for Greene County found in Ober File. Should we believe that William, aged 83 in 1870 ran off with a younger woman. How young? How Far? How fast? It may have happened that he just died sometime in the 1860-1873 period. I am grateful to Lisa Ober for provision of the 1870 Census of Greene County Indiana which shows William and Elizabeth living together in Greene County and for my money, relieves William of the historical burden of leaving Elizabeth for a younger woman. What I suspect is that William died sometime between 1870-1873.

- K. JOHN HUSE BLAND (May 8, 1868 July 20, 1956). John was born in Greene County Indiana and died in Concordia Kansas. He married Lenore Shaw (May 9, 1877 April 9, 1963) on May 10, 1894. They were grandparents of another favorite correspondent, Lenore Bland Brown Nichol.
- L. MARY CORDELIA BLAND (April 1, 1872) born in Greene County and died in Fairview Oklahoma. Mary married a Mr. ____ Riley or Wiley.
- M. EDWARD S. BLAND (C1880-1899)
- N. MALCOLM O. BLAND (February 7 or July 2, 1882 May 1967)

 Malcolm was born in Concordia Kansas and died in Denver or Englewood Colorado. He married Elizabeth J. Ranney.

- **ENOCH BLAND** (November 9, 1833 September 19, 1920) 332 Enoch, younger brother of James Otis Daniel Bland, discussed above, was born in Greene County Indiana, and left for Kansas about the same time as James. He settled in Mitchell County, adjacent to Cloud County where James settled. By 1889, Enoch moved to Concordia in Cloud County and lived near James O.D. Enoch had served in the Civil War with his brother James and a cousin Robert Henry Bland from Greene County in Company A, 115th Volunteer Infantry. During his military term, Enoch contracted diarrhea and measles and was left with a lifelong susceptibility to asthma and bronchitis. This disability prevented him from doing the hard work of a farmer, thus Enoch worked as a hotel keeper with his son John. It also seems to have made him more or less dependent on his son John. Mary Cooper, his second wife, seems to have died before 1900 and Enoch went with his son John to Omaha Nebraska about 1900. By 1910, Enoch and John were in Los Angeles California where

he spent the last ten years of his life. His military papers describe him as he was, about age 30, 5' 7", fair complexion, blue eyes and red hair. As in most areas of his life, Enoch followed brother James in choice of a wife, marrying (1st) Catherine Gaines Gentry (C1839-July 5, 1879) in Greene County on July 28, 1855. Catherine is buried in Mitchell County Kansas. Enoch married (2nd) the widow Mary E. Wilkie Cooper (C1851- before 1900) in Greene County, Indiana, where he had returned after Catherine's death, on April 1, 1880. All of his children were by Catherine Gentry:

- A. Henry Bland (May 18, 1856 December 10, 1935), a school teacher and photographer, (which among other things, leaves us with many good photos of the family) 334 Henry was born in Greene County and died in Pattonsburg, Daviess County Missouri (Carved from Ray County, which may have placed Henry's family in proximity to the Blands descended from John Bland (1770-1842) and Mary Lee, (see above, pp. 51-53). Henry married Mary Isabella Owen (October 6, 1860 November 11, 1924) in Mitchell County Kansas on May 30, 1878. Henry and Emma died in Pattonsburg Missouri and are buried there at the Old Town Cemetery. They had twelve children. 335
- B. <u>WILLIAM EDWARD BLAND</u> (October 29, 1857 November 8, 1884) William was born in Greene County and must have died in Mitchell County Kansas. He was married but nothing is known of his family.
- C. JAMES SHELTON BLAND (August 19, 1859 after 1900)

 James was born in Indiana. He married Ida Owens (C1864), a younger sister of Henry Bland's wife Emma Owens, in Mitchell County Kansas, on February 5, 1884. 336 They had five children.
- D. JOSEPH WINFIELD "WINNIE" BLAND (February 23, 1861)
 married Maggie Owens in Mitchell County Kansas on
 October 22, 1884 another one of the Owens girls the
 Bland boys found so appealing. He later moved away to
 Omaha Nebraska.

- F. JOHN STEPHEN BLAND (May 17, 1867) John married Lillie M. ____ and they had two children. John was a hotel porter, but later took up railroad work. He and his family moved to Omaha Nebraska about 1900 and Los Angeles California, about 1910, and as noted above, John's father Enoch accompanied them.
- G. L.W. BLAND (c1869-) a female.
- H. Julius Bland (C1874-)

These latter two children may be adopted children who were products of Mary E. Wilkie Cooper's first marriage, so Enoch Bland would have been their step-father. I am pleased to display below the excellent photograph of Enoch Bland with his five sons.

THE BLANDS OF RANDOLPH COUNTY NORTH CAROLINA

As James Bland (C1707-1774) was founder of the family of Blands from Duplin County North Carolina, so his half brother Moses Bland, (C1718-1800) was the founder of a substantial group of Blands who originated in Randolph County North Carolina. Moses and the older James were partners in a business in Prince William County Virginia. After about twenty years, the business went bad in 1752, and soon after James migrated to New Hanover/Duplin County North Carolina. Moses seems to have waited in Virginia a bit longer, for traces of him appear as late as 1771. In 1772, Moses and his son William appear in Land transactions in Anson County North Carolina and first appear on the tax lists of Randolph County in 1779. Moses married Jane Wiggonton in Virginia on January 14, 1750-1751. Jane is assumed to have been born between $1\overline{7}30-11735$. Hence the age of their oldest child, William has previously been assumed to be about 1751. Also, I have variously speculated, based on related land transactions and a letter written by Moses Bland (1848-1920) to a nephew Levi Edward Bland on October 19, 1902, that William lived to about 1801 and that he married a woman named Julia Ward. 337 A new correspondent, Steven Deitz of Woodlake California, claims to have been contacted by "a lady" who gives William's date of death as 1816, hence (1751-1816) and that he married Rachel Ward on July 15, 1772 in Anson County North Carolina. 338 Interesting information, but thus far, my attempts to contact "a lady" for confirmation, have been unproductive. Among the nine children of William Bland and his wife Julia/Rachel, were John Bland (Continued on page 132)

(Continued from page 130) (c1790-1830) who married a cousin Mary Bland (1793-1857) (a daughter of William's brother Benjamin Bland) on October 9, 1811, in Clark County Indiana. They were parents of six children including a third son:

- 1. NOAH BLAND (July 19, 1815 February 14, 1897). Noah married Susannah Hand (1819-1866) on September 15, 1837, in Bigger Township, Jennings County Indiana. In 1840, Noah sold his land and moved to Ripley County Indiana. After 1850, Noah and Susannah moved to Sharpville, Tipton County Indiana. They had four children:
 - A. CALVIN L. BLAND (April 24, 1839 June 18, 1860)
 - B. NANCY ELLEN BLAND (June 1, 1841 January 29, 1904. Nancy married Joseph H. Robinson on September 6, 1856 and they had one daughter.
 - C. JOHN C. BLAND (August 3, 1843 November 9, 1861) John served with the Union in the Civil War, Company C, 26th Indiana Volunteers. He was killed in action.
 - D. MARY ANN BLAND (April 11, 1849 September 4, 1857).

Noah remarried to Elizabeth Marshall Franklin (March 28, 1830 - April 11, 1919) on April 2, 1868. Elizabeth was born Greenbrier County Virginia. Children of the marriage of Noah Bland and Elizabeth Marshall Franklin were:

- F. FRANCES ELEANOR BLAND (February 21, 1869 June 2, 1961). Eleanor married Lewis Allen Kirtley (1865-1954) on March 6, 1891. 340 They had four children.

 Olive married William Thomas Broyles (1871-1929) on
 September 26, 1896. They had six children.

H. LUCY V. BLAND (February 28, 1873 - 1963) Lucy married Oliver P. Nash on September 12 or 22, 1893. Lucy died in Chico California. Like many Blands, Lucy was touched by a train, though not fatally. Lucy visited a talkative niece in Kokomo Indiana at age 74. Whilst the niece was driving Lucy around the town, she was talking so much that she neglected to notice that she had turned into the path of a slow moving freight train, which gently struck the car on Lucy's side and pushed it gently down the track a ways. No one was hurt. Lucy and Oliver had three children. I am pleased to display below a photograph of Olive Elizabeth Bland (1871-1950) and Lucy V. Bland (1873-1963).

THE BLANDS OF EDGEFIELD COUNTY SOUTH CAROLINA

This line begins in Loudon County Virginia, with Robert Bland (C1708-1760) married to Jane . In <u>Vision of Unity</u> 342 I made the mistake of characterizing this Robert as the son of the original settler James Bland ($166\tilde{1}$ -1709) which I was later forced to acknowledge was an error, because a grandson of James Bland in 1774 laid claim to land owned by James, and testified that his son Robert, "died without issue." It is clear, however, that there was a Robert Bland in Prince William County as early as 1735 and again in Loudon (formed in 1757 from Fairfax which was formed from Prince William in 1742). Many of he transactions made by this Robert Bland involved associates of William Bland (C1686-1744), suggesting that our Robert was the grandson of James Bland (1661-1709) rather than his son and a son of William Bland (1686-1744) by his first wife. Robert and Jane had three sons including Edward (1730-1800), Robert (March 9, 1732/1733 - March 27, 1787) and William $(C1744-1771)^{343}$. Robert's birth date was given with precision in the Dero Darwin Bible Record. Edward Bland, the oldest son's, birth year is projected back from Robert's proven date and the elder Robert's birth year is poised at C1708 because William Bland has been shown to be born close to 1686. 344 Robert married Ann on April 10, 1857 and they subsequently had a family of ten children. There has been some interest in children John (1757-1781), Presley (1768-1839) and Elisha (1775-1837), but not enough to develop a reprisal of their lines. This issue is primarily concerned with Payton/Peyton Bland.

1. PEYTON BLAND (January 1, 1780 - March or April 1815) In the Darwin Family Bible which defined the family of Peyton's parents Robert Bland and Ann , the name was Payton, taken from an old Virginia Family, but Peyton, as well as his son Peyton always spelled his name with an E and we will honor it that way.

Edward, Robert and William repeatedly appear on lists of tithables in Loudon County: Virginia County Court Records: Tithables, Loudon County Virginia 1758-1769 (1991) and Tithables, Loudon County Virginia, 1770-1774 (1992); Cf, Ruth and Sam Sparacio, Comp. Fee Books of Loudon County Virginia 1762, 1764, 1765 (1987); Robert Bland appears as court cryer and constable in Virginia County Court Records: Will Abstracts of Loudon County Virginia, Will Book C, January 13, 1783 – 8 September 1788 (1988). In a document I have not seen before, on December 24, 1771, Robert Bland (1772-1787) in Loudon County Virginia sells land to Thomas Hutchinson, including the "late dwelling place of William Bland." Since the dates of movement of his parents from Virginia to South Carolina is reckoned at 1778-1784, Peyton could have been born in either state (or colony). He died in St. Martin's Parish Louisiana, shortly after returning home sick from service in the War of 1812. Peyton served with Bakers 15th Regiment of the Louisiana Militia beginning January 3, 1815 and with Captain Shadrach Porter's Infantry until he was discharged on March 13, 1815.

Peyton married Elizabeth Smith (1794-1857), 347 daughter of Jesse Smith and Susan Wordein from Darlington County South Carolina about 1809.348 Peyton bought land in Louisiana on February 4, 1808, so he married Elizabeth in Louisiana, where they applied for a marriage license. Elizabeth was reputed by family legend to be a rough, tough character "Large of stature, standing six feet, two inches and weighing 200 pounds or more," roomy. She was red headed, fiery tempered, carried six shooters on her hips and was afraid of nothing. 349 Elizabeth was a self-trained physician and mid-wife and made her rounds on horseback. They joined a party of migrants from South Carolina to Louisiana. After Peyton died, Elizabeth entered into about 20 years of stormy times. She married Robert Johnson (C1787-1856) on January 8, 1817. By Johnson, she had a son named Warren Johnson. It is possible that this Robert Johnson was descended from the Robert Johnson with whom Peyton's father Robert Bland consumated an indenture in Loudon County Virginia on August Parallel to her marriage with Johnson, Elizabeth had a relationship with John Dickerson and bore his child, Joseph Dickerson, in 1822. 350 It has been said that Johnson refused to keep Elizabeth's children by Peyton Bland, John and Peyton (discussed below) which forced Elizabeth to indenture them to Asa Foreman and Benjamin Fork in January 1823. Quite possibly, Johnson's anger over this child by Dickerson could be the reason John and Peyton were indeptured. 351 About 1824 Fligsboth loft Louisians with Jacob About 1824, Elizabeth left Louisiana with Joseph indentured. Dickerson and headed for Texas, leaving behind her sons John and Peyton. By 1827, Elizabeth was living with Robert Johnson, but by 1830, she was alone in the census of that year in St. Landry

history was given by David Bland (1843-1927), a son of Peyton's son John (1811-1886) about a year before he died, so has extremely valuable historical insights. Hereafter it is called David Bland.

Parrish, with one daughter (Caroline) and one male child (Joseph Dickerson or Warren Johnson). Elizabeth returned to Green's Bluff, the area that became Jefferson/Orange County Texas in 1835, with her sons Peyton and John. The Mexican government granted her a league of land, (4428 acres). At this time, she had five children, including the two Bland boys and their sister Caroline young Johnson and Dickerson. Sometime between 1840 and 1850, Elizabeth was reconciled with Robert Johnson, for they are found together in the 1850 Census.

Peyton Bland and Elizabeth had three children, whose descendants became the pioneers of Orange County Texas, which was formed in 1852 from Jefferson County, which in turn was created from the old Mexican Territory in 1836. Their children were:

- A. <u>JOHN BLAND</u> (March 5, 1811 November 2, 1886) 353 John was born at St. Martin's Parish Louisiana and died in Orange County Texas. At age 11, on January 18, 1823 John was indentured to one Asa Foreman in St. Landry Parish Louisiana, and worked with him until he was 21, when Foreman , who was obliged to educate John during his indenture "to the third rule," paid him \$20. And gave him a horse and saddle. John married Mary Foreman (February 4, 1816 - January 13, 1904), 354a daughter of Joseph Ephrem Foreman and Marie Charolette, on February 21, 1831. John and Mary left Louisiana for the Mexican Territory in 1835. David Bland writes "My parents moved from Louisiana to Texas in 1835." 355 They moved to the part of Jefferson County that later became Orange County. John served in the Texas Revolution from September 2, 1836 to March 2, 1837. 356 John received some 4428 acres of land from the Mexican Government in 1835 and a bounty grant of 640 acres from the new State of Texas in 1841. After the war, he was a farmer, who was said to have loved liquor, horses and gambling, all in moderation of course, and from his prolific family, one would judge that he loved Mary Foreman. Their children were:
 - (1) <u>Joseph Bland</u> (June 8, 1832 November 8, 1915) <u>Joseph was born in St. Martins Parish Louisiana and died in Orange County Texas. Joseph married (1st) Martha Thomas, by whom he had four children.</u>

At Mansfield, in absence of his commanding officer, David personally demanded the surrender of Yankee forces. After another year of fighting, David wrote "In Burleson County on the Brazos, we were mustered out on May 18, 1865. I reached home in June, and soon resumed employment as a private citizen, but always a Confederate Veteran. A picture of David Bland in his military uniform may be found in Volume 3-1 (page 37) of Among Cousins. David worked for a spell min the timber business after the Civil war but then went back to farming and stuck with it. Late in his life he also wrote a history of his family which is invaluable for its freshness and

- C. Peyton Bland (September 25, 1815 September 17, 1872) Peyton was born in St. Martins Parish Louisiana and died in orange County Texas. At age seven, on January 18, 1823, Peyton was indentured to Benjamin Fork at St. Landry Parish in Louisiana, under terms similar to those of his brother John with Asa Foreman. It is probable that he remained in Louisiana until this indenture was finished and about 1834 with his mother and stepfather moved into Jefferson/Orange Texas. 365 He served in the Texas Revolution from September-December 1835, serving in David Gardner's Company. 366He served again in March and April 1836. Peyton married Susannah Harmon (November 2, 1822 - August 15, 1892) in Jefferson/Orange County Texas on May 8, 1838. Peyton enlisted in the Coast Guard on July 9, 1862, but served only a short time. Peyton was known as a big man, one witness recalled "he was huge, with pistols on his hips, it scared us kids to death." Peyton was a cattle drover. traveling from Far West Texas to New Orleans, where, according to one source, he could sell cattle to the Confederates for \$22. per head. After the Yankees took New Orleans, Peyton could still sell cattle profitably to the Northern Forces in the Civil War. 367 On one drive, took the stock of a man named Coles. Returning from the drive, he threw a bag of money on Cole's table and exclaimed, "there's more money there than you've ever seen or ever will again." Sure enough, Coles lost all his money. In spite of his huge size, Peyton was susceptible to illness, and caught pneumonia during a cattle drive and died. His children searched for his grave which was reportedly on a bluff overlooking the St. Bernard River in Wharton County, but never found it. Peyton Bland and Susannah Harmon had a family of thirteen children: 368

VIRGINIA FAMILIES

EAMUEL BLAND: MECKLENBURG COUNTY VIRGINIA AND WILSON COUNTY

TENNESSEE This family group, with distant origins in Mecklenburg County Virginia, (formed in 1764 from Lunenburg County) has thus far stubbornly resisted linkage to other Bland lines. 371 was made aware of the line in 1981-1982 while writing A Vision of Unity by Mrs. Jack (Marjorie Bland) Sayles, of Abilene, Texas.

On July 23, 1725, in Elizabeth City County, Virginia, Samuel and Martha Bland witnessed the will of John Merritt. Nothing more is known of this Samuel Bland except that on September 4, 1755, a court in Warwick County, Virginia ordered settlement of Samuel Bland's estate. Thus, Samuel appears to have been born in the late 17th, early 18th century, and to have died in 1755. His dates are estimated (1700-1755). His wife was assumed to be Martha Merritt. Samuel and Martha appear to have had three children:

- 1. MERRITT BLAND (c1730 1773) The eldest child of Samuel Bland and Martha Merritt was Merritt Bland, who was born prior to 1730, proved by his appointment to a jury on June 6, 1751 in Warwick County. Merritt died in Mecklenburg County Virginia. His will was made March 2, 1773 and probated May 10, 1773. His will mentions a wife named Sarah _____ and four children 373:
 - A. SAMUEL 1. BLAND (c1752-1820) Samuel's will was made January 22, 1820 and probated February 21, 1820. Samuel was a Justice of the Peace, and was executor of his father's will. He seems to have fought with his siblings about his father's will. His chased a lawman off his property with gunfire when the hapless man attempted to deliver a summons. His son Williamson was a chip off the old block, for when the lawman ran the next day, Williamson took a gun to him. Samuel was a horse breeder and lived on the far his father left him. Samuel married Elizabeth Williamson of Charlotte County Virginia, on June 12, 1781.
 - (1) Williamson Bland (C1782 after 1856) 374 Williamson died in Wilson County Tennessee. He married Dorcas Williams (February 21, 1782 July 19, 1836), in Mecklenburg County Virginia on November 17, 1806. Williamson and Dorcas moved their family to Wilson County Tennessee in the Fall of 1829. This was an intermediary step, for Williamson's son John fought in the war of 1812 and was rewarded by some bounty land in the Arkansas Territory, which became a State in 1836. The land was evidently in the area of Washington County that became

Benton County in 1840. They had a family of eight known children, all born in Mecklenburg County Virginia.

- (a) Samuel L. Bland (September 26, 1808 February 26, 1832). Samuel was a teacher with a promising career that was cut short when he choked to death on a fish-bone. He was married to Mahalia Brinkley on January 22, 1830.
- (b) Sarah Ann Bland (January 5, 1809 after June 1860) Sarah married Archibald Cox in Virginia. They evidently went to Tennessee ahead of their parents.
- (c) Celia E. Bland (August 12, 1813 February 11, 1873) Celia died in Benton County Arkansas. The genealogist Dee Swift characterized her as "not bright, but not an idiot either." (Kind of like me). Swift then contradicts himself by confirming that Celia was smart enough to stay single.
- (d) Elizabeth W. Bland (September 4, 1815 January 4, 1872) She married William C. "Dry Billy" Patterson and according to the colorful Swift, "they had a raft of kids." Elizabeth died in Benton County Arkansas.
- (e) John Williamson Petross Bland (December 22, 1817 May 20, 1903) John W.P. married Malinda Jane Porterfield (C1825-) in Wilson County Tennessee on October 9, 1844. They moved into Benton County Arkansas in 1856. 376 and were parents of eight children:
 - (I) Mary Ann Elizabeth Bland (1847-) Mary Ann married Edward Jennings at Larue, Benton County Arkansas.
 - (II) James Bland (1848 1900) James married Tennessee Ryan. A former correspondent Jewell Hegwood Dye, claimed that James "married" and "remarried".
 - (III) Samuel Merritt Bland (June 17, 1849 April 28, 1911). Samuel married Amanda Catherine Tucker on October 22, 1871. They had eight children. 377

Fayte served as a sergeant in the CSA, Company F, 7th Regiment, Tennessee Army. He was captured at Hatcher's Run April 2, 1865 and was detained at Camp Lookout Maryland, at the same time as his distant cousins Lawrence Nathan Bland of Edgefield County South Carolina (1845-1902) Christopher Columbus Bland (1846-1917) of the Pitt County North Carolina Family. 380 Fayte was released on May 20, 1865. 381 Fayte Bland and Elizabeth Porterfield had a family of six children, all of whom, excepting Mary Jane, were born in Wilson County Tennessee and died in Coryell or Merkel Texas:

JOHN AND CHARLES BLAND, AMHURST COUNTY VIRGINIA AND FAYETTE, GIBSON, HAYWOOD, SHELBY AND WILSON COUNTIES, TENNESSEE

JOHN AND CHARLES BLAND John Bland must have been born about 1745, for he had a land survey completed on both sides of the Pedlar River in Amhurst County Virginia which was formed in 1761 from Albemarle County, on November 7, 1766. John and his brother Charles (whose name sequences are repeated later in the family line) surveyed property in Amhurst County at about the same time in 1767. John acted as security for a mortgage on July 29, 1772. Amhurst county stands apart from other major lines, giving rise to the possibility that John and Charles were immigrants from England.

JESSE BLAND (C1775 - 1833) Jesse could be a son of either John or Charles above. He married Sally Newman on May 11, 1801, in Amhurst County Virginia. Jesse and Sally bought some 605 acres in Amhurst County between 1803-1811. They sold 394 acres of land in 1808-1809 and sold 228 acres on September 12, 1815. Subsequently Jesse and Sally they disappear from the records of the county, to reappear in Gibson County Tennessee, in June 1833, where they sell 200 acres to Daniel Cherry. Sarah Bland appears in a lawsuit in Rutherford County Tennessee May 16, 1842, in which Jesse, William and Eleanor Bland grant power of attorney to Cornelius Bland "our brother" to dispose of the residuals in the Will of John Newman that were to benefit, Sarah Newman Bland "our mother." 388

Primary researchers of this line include Herbert Francis Bland Jr., Paragould Arkansas; Marilieu Stanley, Dallas Texas, Neta Davis, Broken Bow Oklahoma, and Martha Bland, Grand Junction Tennessee whose material was sent to me January 4, 1999 and is hereafter called Martha Bland File. See previous information, AC 4-1, pp. 26-27, AC 5-2, pp. 20-22, AC 7-1, pp. 17-19, AC 7-2, p. 17, AC 9-2, pp. 36-37, AC 12-2, pp. 23-30. Also useful is a summary by Francis Bland, July 1991, herafter called Francis Bland. ³⁸⁷ AC 12-2, pp. 23-24.

AC 7-1, p. 18, In his will Newman mentioned Sarah as well as sons Lorenzo, John and Allen as well as daughter Elizabeth Newman Pinkard. On August 30, 1842, John Bland (1803-1856) of Rutherford County, sold a slave woman named Caroline to Lorenzo Newman and Cornelius Bland. Subsequently, Cornelius Bland bought Caroline outright for \$150 And then resold her for \$5 on September 6, 1842 to Joseph Newman, who was Cornelius' security for a debt of \$115 that Cornelius owed Lorenzo Newman. Cornelius retained his entitlement to Caroline by discharging his debt to Lorenzo Newman. Ultimately, on October 9, 1845, Lorenzo Newman sold a slave man named Henry for \$500. And used part of the proceeds to buy poor Caroline from Cornelius Bland. Apart from the sad commentary of our ancestor's traffic in human beings as commodities as exchange, this establishes a very strong relationship between the Blands and Newmans.

- A. JOHN BLAND (C1804 September 1856) 389 a Baptist Minister who was born in Virginia. John married Elizabeth (C1804-1857), also from Virginia, about 1825. John was in Rutherford County Tennessee by 1820. He was in Gibson County in 1830 but about 1845 moved to Haywood County where he and Elizabeth were enumerated in the 1850 Census and where they died a few years later. Their children were:

 - (5) Charles N. Bland (1835-1900) Charles married (1st) Elizabeth Lewis Beard (1836-) on January 30, 1860. Elizabeth was a widow with two children, Elizabeth (1853-) and Mary (1857-) by her former marriage. Charles married (2nd) P. Farrow and (3rd) Fanny White on February 16, 1897 in Crockett County Tennessee. Charles N. Bland and Elizabeth beard were in Madison County by 1860. They had a family of six children:
 - (a) John Charles Bland (1861-1893) who married Louisa Lewis (1860-1898) on August 23, 1882 at Crockett County Tennessee and eventually moved with her to Greene County Arkansas where they had a family of four children including:

- C. <u>ELIZABETH BLAND</u> a possible sister of John and Charles Bland, married Burrus Rippletoe in Rutherford County on July 16, 1825. In the 1860 Census for Shelby County, Mary T. Ripatoe (1838-) appears in the household of Addison Bland (1827-) a son of Elizabeth's sister Cornelius.
- D. CORNELIUS BLAND (1800/1810) Cornelius Bland, who is linked by evidence as the son of Jesse Bland, was in Fayette County Tennessee, adjacent to Shelby County, from which it was formed in 1824. In 1830, the Fayette County census has Cornelius, age 40/50 with one female 20/30; one male 20/30; one male 15/20; one male and one female 10/15; one male 5/10 and one male <5. The 1840 Census of Shelby County Tennessee shows him born between 1800-1810. Cornelius is shown as being born in Virginia, per the 1880 census, when he was living in the household of Addison Bland. Children of Cornelius Bland include:
- (1) <u>Daniel Bland</u> (1826 June 3, 1905) Daniel was born in Shelby County, Tennessee and died "West at Cane" in Washington County, from which Benton County was formed. In the 1850 Census, he was living with his brother Addison. In the 1900 Census, Daniel was found in Oklahoma. Daniel married Lucinda Peel, (C1831-) about 1853 in Shelby County Tennessee. Their children were:
 - M.E. Bland, Phonetic Emmy a female (C1854-who was gone from her parents home in 1880. It is possible that she is the M.E. Bland that married W. A. Campbell on November 9, 1876. Campbell was bondsman for the marriage of Thomas M. Bland, a cousin, son of Addison Bland, and Mary A. Jeter noted below.
 - (b) <u>Virginia Elizabeth Bland</u> (C1856) born in Tennessee and died in Sand Springs Oklahoma. Virginia married William Ellis.

To me this suggests that Cornelius Bland has died by 1850, along with his wife, and that these younger siblings Sarah and Martha are in the home of adult children of Cornelius Bland.
